PULITZER-WINNING POET ON CAMPUS

Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Howard Nemerov will be on campus tomorrow to read a selection of his works. Open to all faculty, staff and students without cost, the poetry reading is at 7:30 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre (not the FAB as scheduled originally). A professor of English at Washington University, he received the Pulitzer Prize in 1978 for his book, THE COLLECTED POEMS OF HOWARD NEMEROV. His appearance is cosponsored by the Lectures & Concerts Committee, the LSG, the English Dept. and the All-College Reading List Committee.

LIBERAL ARTS TO BE ADDRESSED

"This College, the Liberal Arts and These Professors" is the title of a pre sentation to be given October 29 by Warren Bryan Martin, Ph.D., a nationally-known innovator and supporter of the liberal arts in education. Open to all

faculty, staff and students, it will begin at 2 p.m. in the MAB.

A senior fellow at the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in Washington, DC, and Princeton, NJ, Martin currently is participating in the foundation's comprehensive study of undergraduate colleges in the United States. His latest book, A COLLEGE OF CHARACTER, received the Association of American Colleges' award in 1984 as the best book on higher education. Martin has been active in college teaching, research, administration and philanthropy and was vice-president of the Danforth Foundation and director of its Graduate Fellowship Program from 1974-80.

His appearance on campus is part of Lindenwood's celebration of "The Year of the Professor," an observance that focuses on teaching as a profession

and on the essential role of the professor in higher education.

TRAVEL-STUDY IN GREECE PLANNED

A tour of Greece that offers three credit hours in English or humanities is planned December 28 through January 18. The purpose of the trip is to study the arts and myths of ancient Greece in their own living contexts as well as through later historical perspectives, including those of selected English writers such as Byron, Keats and Joyce, said Professor Jim Feely, the tour's leader. Cost of the trip from St. Louis is \$1,750 for students taking the course for credit (for others, \$1,800), which includes transportation, lodging, continental breakfast and dinneer.
