
Lindenwood College

Lindenwood Students Will Return to Campus on September 12

Capacity Enrollment Will Be on Hand for Opening of College's 120th Year
—Dr. James W. Clarke, President of Board of Directors,
to Speak at First Convocation

LINDENWOOD'S campus, quiet for three months except for the crews of painters and decorators at work, will come to life on Thursday, September 12, when all new students and the Student Counselors will arrive. A full week's program has been planned before classes are organized on Thursday, September 19.

A representative of the college will be on duty at the Union Station in Kansas City on September 11 and 12 to assist students changing trains there for St. Charles. There will also be a college representative on duty at the Union Station in St. Louis on both days.

Lindenwood begins its 120th collegiate year with a capacity enrollment. Thirty-two states, one territory, Hawaii, and one foreign country, Mexico, are represented in the student body this year. Missouri leads the list with 104 students and Illinois is second with 80. Eastern states represented include New York, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia and Florida. The Pacific Coast will send students from Oregon and Washington, and the South is represented by students from Georgia, Mississippi and Louisiana. Included in the enrollment are approximately 80 girls whose mothers attended Lindenwood.

The formal opening of the college year will be preceded by a faculty conference on the campus from September 9 to 12. The opening meeting of the conference will be a dinner for the faculty and adiminstration staff in Ayres Hall on Monday, September 9. The following two days will be devoted to reports from members of the faculty who did graduate work this summer and to the discussion of plans for registration and the college year.

Miss Rachel Morris, of the Sociology Department, was Lindenwood's representative this year at the University of Minnesota Workshop. Other faculty members who will give reports are Miss Elizabeth Watts of the Fine Arts Department, who studied at Washington University in St. Louis; Richard Orr, of the Speech Department, who did graduate work at Ohio State University; Fletcher McMurry of the Music Department, who studied at the University of Oklahoma, and Henry Turk of the Modern Languages Department, who studied at Washington University.

The Student Counselors, who are upperclassmen, will be on hand to welcome the new students when

they arrive on the campus and to help orient them into college life. The program for Thursday, September 12 includes the start of the college aptitude tests for all freshmen and new students, time to get acquainted with roommates and Student Counselors and a moonlight serenade that night.

The aptitude tests will continue through the following Monday. Recreation and social events planned for the first week include a scavanger hunt on Friday night, a "White Apron Jamboree" on Saturday night, an open house sponsored by the League of Women Voters and a tea on Sunday and dormitory "get-togethers" on Monday night. There will be a street supper sponsored by the Athletic Association on Tuesday night and a college theater party on Wednesday night.

Registration for upperclassmen begins on Monday, September 16 and for freshmen on Tuesday, September 17. A faculty reception for the students will be held in the Fine Arts Building on Friday, September 20.

Dr. James W. Clarke, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church in St. Louis and president of the College's Board of Directors, will speak at the first vesper service of the year on Sunday, September 22.

Dr. Kate L. Gregg is Nominated For State Legislature

Dr. Kate L. Gregg, who retired as a faculty member last June after serving for twenty-two years in the English Department, was nominated as the Democratic candidate for State Representative in the Missouri primary election on August 3. Dr. Gregg, who spent the summer on the Pacific Coast, plans an active campaign before the general election in November.

Dr. Clevenger Tries Out Political Theories as Mayor

It isn't often that a man who devotes most of his life to the study of government and political science has the opportunity to put his ideas into practice. His Honor, Dr. Homer Clevenger, of the History Department at Lindenwood and Mayor of St. Charles, is the exception to this rule.

Dr. Clevenger was elected Mayor in April 1945

and now has had more than a year to see how class room theory works out in practice.

St. Charles has a City Council and the city's official business is transacted largely by five standing committees; the Committee on Streets and Sewers, the Committee on Accounts, the Committee on Ordinances and Printing, the Committee on City Property, and the Committee on Electric Lights. All of the committees are appointed by the mayor.

When asked last year by a Linden Bark reporter if the city government actually works out according to the theories of the textbook, Dr. Clevenger replied: "Technically, yes, but there has been very little written about the actual art of government which would encompass the subject of the human equation when a group of men work together. Personalities bring up unseen problems and any change in the personnel results in differences in the relationship."

Thus far, however, while the councilmen frequently disagree in their councilroom discussions, Dr. Clevenger has found that once a vote is taken and a decision reached, the council accepts it in the spirit of democracy.

Though he admits he may change his mind before his term of office expires, Dr. Clevenger insists that his part time job of Mayor has been fun, as well as a valuable experience for a teacher interested in government and in democracy in action. Will he be a candidate for re-election? Well, that is a question that he prefers to postpone until election time arrives.

Dr. Clevenger joined Lindenwood's faculty in 1941. He holds degrees from the Central Missouri State Teachers College, the George Peabody College for Teachers, and the University of Missouri.
