

Current Comment

RECENTLY I have been reading some articles about youth. Why should I read about youth when I live with them? Reading gives me little information about the youth I know. Feature writers for newspapers frequently ask visiting celebrities, What do you think of boys and girls? Replies are sometimes plaintive and regretful. Not a few people feel the managers of human affairs have lacked the courage of conviction and in addition have been stupid. Knowing that the old codgers in control, like old dogs, cannot be taught new tricks and are not willing to admit final defeat of humanity's highest purposes, incurable optimists turn to youth and rest their hopes in them. Boys and girls never lack friends who believe in them and are ready to help them.

Are young people worthy of the confidence reposed in them? It is easy to speak unfavorably about "our wild young people." Pessimists always have done so. About ten years ago archaeologists were digging up the remains of ancient Babylon. They came upon a clay table bearing an interesting inscription. It read, "Children are thoughtless. They no longer obey their parents. The end of the world is at hand." The upward movement of humanity for five thousand years of recorded history does not support the pessimist.

Is there any reason why optimists should be encouraged? Progress is not an automatic sure-fire machine gun that reduces all obstacles and makes forward movement not only easy but inevitable. It is like peace. Peace is made; it is a conscious achievement. "Blessed are the peacemakers." Blessed, too, are those who give attention to you on whom our hopes or progress rest.

One may assume that the founders of Lindenwood had faith in youth. Those of us who have inherited their faith believe that time and money invested in youth bear rich rewards. On June 4 our seniors will graduate. They will be received into the alumnae association. There can be no doubt that they will be honorable members of that great body of good citizens, home-makers, business and professional women. Lindenwood is willing to be known, as it must be known, by its roots and its fruits.

Maybe some oldsters will read these lines. If so, think of yourselves and your responsibility for the doings of youth. Youth is ingenious. But youth follows the fashions and what youth does is more imitative than inventive. Who sets the fashions and standards? Men and women of assured position and prestige do. What is your influence on youth who, without your knowing it, look to you and say, "Now that is the sort of person I would like to be"? Maturity and old age cannot excuse themselves by a cowardly and irresponsible, "Do as I say and not what I do." Years ago a father wrote to me asking me not to allow his daughter to do a particular thing. I replied that I would execute his order. He wired, "Keep me out of this. I make no order but I don't think you should allow it." That man, typically hopeless, irresponsible, and driven to distraction by "our wild young people" lived to see his daughter's sons become good citizens and soldiers in the present war.

Life on our campus would cure lack of faith in youth. It would develop intelligent sympathy. A recent

Eighty-nine Students to be Graduated At Lindenwood's 118th Commencement

Dr. Virgil Melvin Hancher, President of University of Iowa, to Give Commencement Address Climaxing Week of Varied Activities on the Campus

EIGHTY-NINE members of this year's graduating class will receive degrees, certificates of associate in arts and diplomas at Lindenwood College's 118th annual commencement on June 4. Of this year's graduates, thirty-five are Seniors and will receive degrees.

The commencement address will be delivered by Dr. Virgil Melvin Hancher, president of the University of Iowa. Dr. Hancher, who has been the head of the university since 1941, is a former Rhodes scholar. He holds honorary degrees from Grinnell College, St. Ambrose College, Northwestern University, Cornell College and Beloit College.

The baccalaureate sermon will be preached by Dr. Alvin E. Magary, pastor of the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church of Brooklyn, N. Y., on Sunday, June 3. The subject of his sermon will be "The Beggar at the Beautiful Gate." Dr. Magary is well known as a radio preacher over the Blue network and as an author.

Commencement week will climax a busy month on the campus. On May 18, Alpha Psi Omega presented the annual commencement play, "Outward Bound." On May 26 the college was host to the members of the Senior Class at the annual Senior luncheon at the Missouri Athletic Club and on May 27 the Red Cross held a capping service on the campus to award Nurses' Aide caps to students who had completed the prescribed course of training.



cartoon pictured teen-agers at a counter drinking "cokes." One remarked, "Mother is at the awkward age. She is too old to remember her girlhood and too young to be philosophical."

I look out the window and see a girl running as fast as she can, not because she is in a hurry but because she feels so well. She is graceful, light of foot, and light of heart. Shall I say, "Rose, she lives the life of a rose, the length of a summer's day"? No. It is best to reserve judgment. Soon I shall see her in her own home caring for her own children, a good mother, singing in the church choir, chairman of the program committee of the women's club, getting out the vote on election day.

It would do every citizen good to see our students in action in The Student Association. The Association is self-government in reality. It has a written constitution which is a grant of enumerated powers from the college. Just now a campaign is in progress preliminary to voting. Nominations have been made. Electioneering is red hot. Some do not like the way things are done. They want immediate remedial action. But action must be constitutional and the constitution cannot be amended overnight. So goes self-government. Practical problems arising out of human nature will be solved. These students make a greater success of their government than do the citizens of Zenith City, the typical American city, and do not make the mistake of thinking that their problems are "phoney." They are as real and of the same nature as the problems of the old home town.

Dr. Joseph C. Dewey, Former Faculty Member, Dies

Dr. Joseph C. Dewey, who served as head of the Department of Education at Lindenwood College from 1931 to 1936, died May 14 at Marquette, Mich., after a short illness.
