COED NAMED TO ALL-AMERICA SOCCER TEAM . . . Deborah A. Johnson of the Lady Lions is one of 12 coeds in the United States selected to the 1986 All-America Women's Soccer Team by the National Association of Intecollegiate Athletics (NAIA). A fullback on the women's soccer team, which finished the season with a national fourth-place ranking in NAIA competition, Johnson is a sophomore from Melville, MO. Earlier in the season, she received honorable mention status on the All-Central Region Team by the NAIA.

Receiving an honorable mention on the All-America Team is Kriste Wixson, a

freshman from Lee's Summit, MO, who played backfield. Selected to the 1986 Academic All-America Team, an NAIA recognition for excellence in the classroom as well as on the field, is Mary Alison Daniel of Vista, CA, a senior who played forward.

With one of its most impressive seasons, the Lady Lions won the District 16

and the regional tournaments, and secured a fourth-place national finish in NAIA competition, losing in the last three minutes of semi-finals play.

Both students and faculty of the Art Dept. have received recognition for their work in recent exhibits. The Art Dept. garnered four awards at the 21st Annual Juried Show at the St. Louis Artists Guild - first place in the watercolor and pastels category went to Professor John Wehmer; in the same category, second place went to Nancy Follis, an '86 M.A. graduate; and fourth place in the same category went to Alice Tomek, a special student. Sophomore Renee Pintar took a second-place award in the oil and acrylic paintings category. Mary Spangler, a graduate student, also had a pastel drawing selected for inclusion in the show.

painting selected for inclusion.

Alyce Schermerhorn, a ceramics instructor, received recognition for her work in porcelain with the photographic reproduction of one of her works in a recent issue of CERAMICS MONTHLY, a national magazine of ceramics. And, Grant Hargate, an adjunct instructor of painting and drawing, was one of seven area artists presenting in a recent showing at the Design Center of St. Louis.

PROFESSOR IS CO-AUTHOR OF ARTICLES . . .

Moheb M. Nasr, associate professor of chemistry, is the co-author of two articles published in a recent issue of the JOURNAL OF PHYSICAL CHEMISTRY, a nationally-circulated professional publications. The articles are entitled "Kinetic Nitrogen Isotope Effects on Methyl Transfer to Amines" and "Equilibrium Nitrogen Isotope Effects on the Basicity of Amines." They were written by Nasr and Joseph L. Kurz, professor of chemistry at Washington University along with their coworkers.

Nasr said the publications are a result of collaboration between chemistry departments at both schools. Playing a key part in this collaboration was Terri A. Harris, a senior majoring in chemistry at Lindenwood who was awarded a fellowship last summer at Washington University, one of only eight made to undergraduate chemistry students in the United States.
