

Current Comment

THESE are days of criticism. This is wholesome. Talking things over is an essential part of the democratic process. Those who must participate in decision should think and take part in discussion. Otherwise decision is ill-considered.

Well balanced criticism includes self-examination. This also is healthful. As individuals and institutions we need regular spring cleanings. Between these annual renovations there is the daily business of pick ing up and throwing out. Rubbish tends to pile up. If we did not get rid of things our lives would become a frightful accumulation of riff-raff. Ideals have a way of descending from their high position and getting out of place. In this respect they are just like things supposed to be on a table in a living room. Many times we cannot find what we expect where we think it is. The thing that is kept always in a corner on a table is usually in some other place. Sometimes it is underfoot on the floor. How the inert thing got there is a mystery. That it does so is reason for looking into all of our rooms bent on burning, refreshing and replacing. What we should do for our houses and things in them should of course be done for our minds where ideas and ideals are kept. Wherever the cleaning process goes on one is always surprised to find this or that which has long been taken for granted and was once important but has long since out-grown its usefulness.

There are various ways of measuring the worth of colleges. Marked institutional awareness is an indication that a college is alive, alert and inclined to self-improvement by way of self-examination. It is fair to say that Lindenwood is making progress in academic procedure, campus life and various services to students. This is true because we, teachers and administrative officers who are responsible for welfare of students,

are studying objectives and means whereby goals may be realized. The Faculty's Institutional Study Committee has been at work for three years. For four years a Faculty Committee on Teacher Education in cooperation with similar committees from twenty-five other colleges, has produced a valuable report, "Better Colleges—Better Teachers," which has had a wide distribution. In Lindenwood the cooperative study is responsible for several curricular changes such as the new courses in the humanities and general science.

Changes in curriculum are not immediately obvious to a visitor. New buildings and things in them are what strike the eye of old friends who return to see what is doing on the old campus. We have no new buildings to announce at this time but we can announce a change in use of old buildings. Dr. B. K. Stumberg was convinced that our health service, which under his guidance for many years was marvelously good, could be improved. To him good was not an enemy of the best. Before his death the Board of Directors had approved a plan for establishing Senior Hall as a Health Center and using the present Infirmary in Sibley for dormitory residents. The coming of the war postponed the project. Recently the Board authorized and the Administration ordered the plan to be made effective immediately. Therefore we shall have a greatly improved health service next year. The president will recommend that the building now called Senior Hall be designated The Dr. B. K. Stumberg Health Center. That will be a fitting recognition of his name and plan.

We are looking forward to announcing some change in use of rooms for radio work. This project has been authorized but will not be made effective until purchase of equipment is possible.

Lindenwood Will Hold 118th Annual Commencement on June 4

Dr. Virgil Hancher, President of the University of Iowa, to Deliver Commencement Address, Climaxing Week of Many Activities on the Campus

THE 118th annual commencement of Lindenwood College will be held on Monday, June 4, climaxing a week of special programs on the campus. The commencement address will be given by Dr. Virgil Melvin Hancher, president of the University of Iowa.

Dr. Hancher has been president of the University of Iowa since 1940. He was graduated from the university in 1918 and was awarded a Rhodes scholarship to Oxford University in England. After he received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Oxford he traveled extensively on the continent, before returning to enter the University of Iowa Law School in 1922. He received the degree of juris doctor in 1924. He also holds the honorary degree of doctor of laws, awarded by Grinnell College in 1941; by St. Ambrose College in 1941, and by Northwestern University in 1944. Cornell College awarded him an LH.D. in 1943, and Beloit College an LL.D. in 1944.

Dr. Hancher is chairman of the Committee on Education of the Iowa Postwar Rehabilitation Commission; president of the State University Association, and a member of the Midwest Research Institute and of the American Academy of Political and Social Science.

The baccalaureate sermon will be preached on Sunday, June 3, by Dr. Alvin E. Magary, pastor of the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church of Brooklyn, N. Y. Dr. Magary is well known as a radio preacher. He is the author of the book, "Character and Happiness," and was for a number of years a contributor to the editorial page of the Detroit Free Press. He is a director of the Auburn Theological Seminary and in 1935-36 gave a series of lectures at the Chicago Presbyterian Theological Seminary. He has been pastor of the Lafayette Avenue Church since 1930.

There are 92 candidates for degrees and certificates in this year's graduating class. Thirty-five are Seniors and are candidates for bachelor of arts, bachelor of science and bachelor of music degrees.

One of the features of Commencement Week will be the Alumnae Day on Saturday, June 2. A cordial invitation is extended to all alumnae and former students of Lindenwood to return to the campus on that day. The program for the day will include an open house at the Gables from 2:30 to 6 p. m., the annual alumnae dinner in Ayres Dining Room at 6 p. m., and the annual meeting of the Lindenwood Alumnae Association and election of officers. The Commencement Week program will climax a month of special activities on the campus. The annual luncheon given by the college to the members of the Senior Class, will be held this year on May 26 at the Missouri Athletic Club. On May 18 the annual commencement play, "Outward Bound," will be given by Alpha Psi Omega and on May 27 the Red Cross will hold a capping service on the campus to award Nurses' Aide caps to students who have completed the prescribed course of training.

Postwar Opportunities For Women Is Theme of Conference

Speakers From Many Fields Address Students at Lindenwood's Vocational Conference Held on the Campus
April 5 to April 19

Postwar opportunities for women was the theme of the Vocational Conference held on the campus beginning April 5. The keynote address, "Tomorrow Is Too Late," was delivered by Miss Margaret Hickey, principal of Miss Hickey's Training School for Secretaries and president of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs.

Speaking on the subject, "Tomorrow Is Too Late," Miss Hickey pointed out that "it is a striking fact that all of the blueprints for the world's future are primarily concerned with the basic needs of life with which women have always been concerned—housing, food, employment, education, religion, family and security."

Education for women, she said, must prepare them to "box the compass, home, career, community, world. No matter how adequate a woman may be as a politician or a dentist or a teacher or a secretary, unless she can look with an unintimidated eye at the kitchen stove and the dishes afterward, her education is incomplete. On the other hand, she may be a magnificent homemaker and still be a failure if she is not prepared to make some contribution to the culture and the social life of the community of which her home is a part."

A motion picture, "Finding Your Life Work" was presented during the conference and a panel discussion on "Vocational Opportunities for Women in the United States Foreign Service" was given by the following students: Jean McDonald, Mary Ann Parker, Hildegarde Stanze and Frances Watlington.
