VALUATION SCIENCES INSTITUTE FORMED

The International Valuation Sciences Institute (IVSI) has been established on campus to sponsor higher education, research and publication in the fields of valuation and appraisal, especially for educators and students.

This May, the IVSI will offer the International Valuation Sciences degree program on campus, attracting appraisers from throughout the world.

"Through its new programs, the institute will increase its international impact on appraisal," said Richard Rickert, director of Lindenwood's valuation sciences program and the IVSI. Rickert along with the American Society of Appraisers of Washington, DC, have been instrumental in establishing the IVSI, the first organization of its kind in the appraisal and valuation profession.


Available are portable, desk top and personal computers as well as Zenith printers and software. Savings are about 10 percent above cost.

This unit has a suggested retail price of nearly \$2,800, but through the college, it can be purchased for less than \$1,600 - a savings of nearly 43 percent.

As part of its agreement with Zenith Data Systems, Lindenwood requires that purchases by any student, faculty member or college
