DOWNSTAGE TO PRESENT 'MASS APPEAL' . . .

The Lindenwood Downstage Theatre will open the semester with "Mass Appeal," a comedy by Bill C. Davis, scheduled March 5-7 at the FAB. Directed by graduate student Patrick O'Driscoll of St. Louis, the play revolves around the conflict between an older, sedate priest and a young, radical seminarian. Shows begin at 8 p.m., and a \$1 donation is requested at the door.

The Downstage Theatre is a student-run, student-operated venture. Past productions have included "'Night Mother," "A Coupla White Chicks Sitting Around Talking" and "Kennedy's Children." Later this semester, students will present Christopher Durang's "Baby with the Bathwater," March 26-28.
