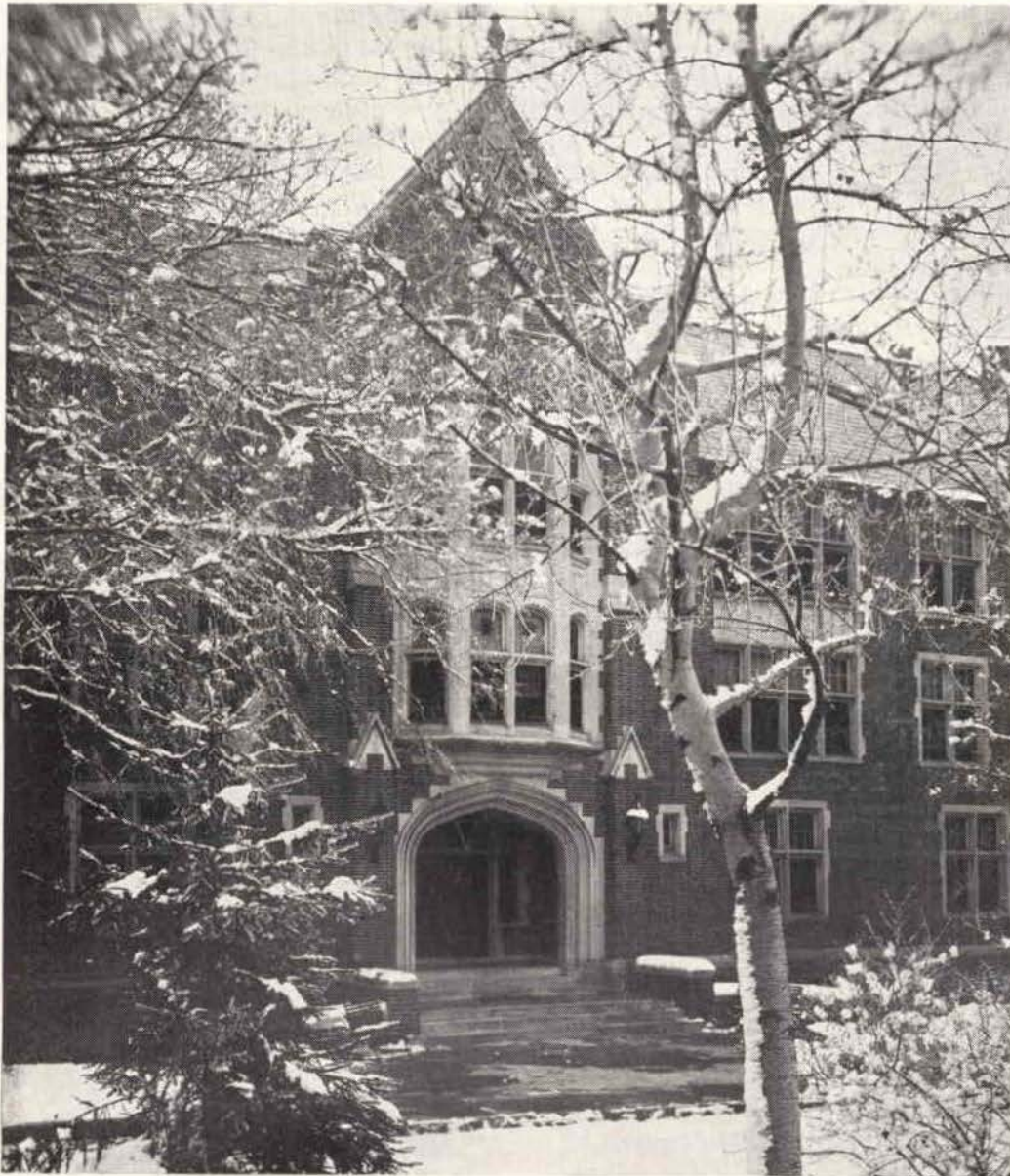

Current Comment

FOLLOWING the first severe bombing of Manchester, England, loitering on streets was strictly prohibited. Thereafter the editor of *The Guardian* was standing alone on a street corner in the blackness of night. A policeman ordered the editor to disperse. The editor, who was inclined to be obedient, knew that he could go away but did not know how to go simultaneously in different directions. To disperse seemed to be beyond intellectual comprehension and physical possibility.

However ridiculous the policeman's order may have been when applied to individuals rather than crowds, it, nevertheless, has serious implications. It merits a bit of soul-searching. Tests for admission to the army reveal the point now in mind. Twenty per cent of men examined have been rejected. Fifty per cent of those rejected have been rejected on account of nervous and mental infirmity.

So a question is posed. It is not, Are we insane? It is rather, How sane are we? What is our state of mental health? As a matter of fact our mental infirmities are quite as numerous as our physical ailments. An honest diagnosis would state that we as individuals are dispersed intellectually. We do go in different directions in our thinking. Our thought, therefore, lacks consistency. Within split seconds we entertain conflicting ideas. This is dreadfully upsetting. If continued it paralyzes action and may throw one into contortions of intellectual agony. In varying degrees we are all scatter-brained. The result is that person-

ally and nationally we lack in some degree that decisiveness which marks strong character.

Sometimes the scatter-brain is restless. He cannot sit still in his mind. He lacks emotional stability. He is inclined to break down under strain and to blow up in excitement. These emotional disturbances are more frequent than intellectual strains. Most people are subject to feelings most of the time and lack profound intellectual seriousness.

What is the cure? We feel the need for a cure. One cannot be happy and efficient when intellectually dispersed and emotionally upset. A man always wants to be "at himself" and not "every which way." Frequently one says, Now I must collect myself; I have "all gone to pieces"; I must bring myself together. Obviously the cure is something that will integrate our disintegrated selves. It is not enough that we should be men of parts, maybe brilliant parts; we must also be men of character. We must be men of principle. Integrity comes from a clearly understood and tenaciously held principle which applies to and controls and holds together all thoughts and feelings. The result is a man of character. Wherever he is, he is, as we say, "all there."

The cure, therefore, is finding the north star in our intellectual firmament. "I will keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee." It is in our minds that we achieve the peace that distinguishes happy and successful people. Mental peace comes from fixing one's

Capacity Enrollment Already Assured For 1944-45

Heavy Advance Registration for Next Year—Alumnae Are Urged to Send in Reservations for Relatives and Friends at Once

THE fame of Lindenwood's high scholastic standards and the many advantages it offers its students is spreading. Never before in the history of the college have there been so many advance registrations for the 1944-45 college year. Guy C. Motley, secretary of the college and assistant to the President, has announced that more registrations for next year were on hand last month than have been received in past years in June and July.

Lindenwood regrets that literally hundreds of applications for both the first and second semester of the 1943-44 college year could not be accepted.

Mr. Motley urges all alumnae who have relatives or friends who plan to attend Lindenwood next year to make their reservations as soon as possible.

Two new members have been added to the college's faculty for the second semester. Dr. Marie Finger has been appointed Director of Student Guidance and Personnel to serve during the absence of Dr. Florence W. Schaper, now a Lieutenant in the WAVES. Dr. Finger succeeds Mrs. Mary Ellen Jacob, who resigned to join her husband, Major Samuel Sprigg Jacob, of the United States Army.

Dr. Finger, who came to Lindenwood last month, was formerly a member of the faculty of the Illinois State Normal University. She was graduated from Lawrence College, Appleton, Wis., in 1925, received her master's degree in education at Northwestern University in 1935, and her Ph. D. degree from Northwestern in 1940. She has also done graduate work at the University of Wisconsin, the University of California, the School of International Studies at Geneva, Switzerland, and the University of Washington.

Miss Mary Marshall Miller has been named assistant Director of Student Guidance and Personnel, and joined the faculty after the Christmas vacation. She was graduated from the University of Kansas in 1926 and received her master's degree in Sociology from the University of Missouri in 1936. She was a member of the faculty of the St. Joseph, Mo., Junior College before coming to Lindenwood.

Final examinations for the first semester began January 31 and the second semester will open on February 7.

There are now fifty-six stars in the college's roll of honor. Two Lindenwood graduates now hold ensign commissions in the United States Coast Guard Women's Reserve. Miss Doris Larimore, of Rogers, Ark., a member of the Class of '39, received her commission on September 17, 1943. Miss Sarah Davis Hedgecock, of Hampton, Iowa, was commissioned on June 23, 1943.
