DEAN OF ADMISSIONS RESIGNS . . . Dean of Admissions Miriam E. King-Watts has resigned to accept a position as Dean of Admissions & Financial Aid at Chatham College in Pittsburgh, effective July 1. In announcing her resignation, President James I. Spainhower said, "We are extremely grateful for Miriam's many years of commendable service to Linden-wood. Although we will miss her, we rejoice at this opportunity for her career and for her to return to her home state of Pennsylvania." Founded in 1869, Chatham is a private, four-year college for women, serving about 700. King-Watts attended Lindenwood from 1962-64 and is a 1966 graduate of Pennsyl-

vania State University where she majored in consumer services and business. She obtained a master's degree in adult studies at Lindenwood in 1982. She joined the college in 1975 as head resident of the Lindenwood College for Women. She was appointed assistant director of admissions and the LCIE in 1976 and, four years later, as director of LCIE admissions. She was appointed to her current position by Spainhower in February, 1984.
