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KIWANIS CLUB ESTABLISHES \$100,000 TRUST

The St. Charles (Noon Day) Kiwanis Club has created a \$100,000 permanent scholarship endowment trust for students from Lindenwood and area high schools. Considered to be one of the largest scholarship trusts created by a single service club in the Midwest, the trust will provide a minimum of nine scholar-ships each year. The highest award is the Renaissance Medal of Honor, which is presented jointly by the college and the Kiwanis Club and provides a full-tuition scholarship for a Lindenwood student.

Instumental in arranging the gift for Lindenwood were Kiwanis Club members Rudy Beck, chairman of the scholarship committee; Frank C. Young, immediate past president of the club; current President Paul D. Orf; and Jim Thompson,

a Kiwanian and director of development.

QUARTER SYSTEM BEGINS IN FALL . . . As a means of providing more flexibility and services to adult students, the LCIE will change its calendar from the trimester to the quarter system this fall. The change consolidates the Evening College and LCIE, and it provides four terms a year for all adult offerings, including the graduate program in business administration both on and off campus.

"This change will serve to put the Evening College on parallel courses and will allow adult students greater flexibility in planning their programs of

" said Arlene Taich, dean of the Evening/LCIE Division.

With the switch to the quarter system for LCIE, the new termbegins October 2 for all adult programs. Day courses for traditional students begin September 2.

BOARD APPROVES \$8.83 MILLION BUDGET

The Lindenwood board has approved a fiscal 1987-88 budget of \$8.83 million, The Lindenwood board has approved a fiscal 1987-88 budget of \$8.83 million, a 4.7% increase from this year's budget. Effective July 1, the new budget calls for anticipated revenue of \$6.14 million from tuition, \$1.3 million from gifts and other sources and \$1.37 million from auxiliary operations. Tuition for the 1987-88 academic year increases 9.2%, from \$5,200 to \$5,680 for full-time day students. Room and board this fall will be \$3,190.

"Although it has been necessary to make a modest increase in tuition, the college remains below the national average for its tuition and room-and-board charges," said President Jim Spainhower. "We have checked with area colleges and find that we are about the same as other institutions of our size " he said

and find that we are about the same as other institutions of our size," he said. If operational costs remain as budgeted, the 1987-88 fiscal year will show a surplus of \$111,085, and would represent the sixth straight year the college has ended operations with a balanced budget.

Of importance to Lindenwood employees is a 5% salary increase for all fulltime faculty and staff plus equity adjustments in some positions, effective

July 1.

\$20,000 GIFT FROM GREEN FOUNDATION

Lindenwood has received a \$20,000 gift from the Allen P. and Josephine B. Green Foundation of Mexico, MO, that will be used for scholarship assistance. The gift raises the Green Foundation's contribution to \$80,000 and marks the fourth year it has supported Lindenwood. The philanthropic foundation honors the memory of the Greens, grandparents of former Gov. Christopher S. Bond who operated a brick refractory business near Mexico. The \$20,000 will be combined with more than \$700,000 that is slated to be awarded in direct support this year for scholarship assistance.

PROFESSOR'S PAINTINGS EXHIBITED

A painting by Dean Eckert, professor and chairman of the Art Dept., recently was shown in a regional juried exhibition in Kansas City, MO. The acrylic paint-"Velazquez at Segovia, was included in the Mid-Four Exhibit at the Nelson ing, Gallery. The competitive exhibit was open to artists from Missouri and adjacent states of Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska; from more than 1,550 entries, Eckert's and 60 others were selected.

Another painting by Eckert, "Segovia: Casa de los Picos," is being shown now

through July 19 in the Realism Today Exhibit at the Evansville Museum of Arts & Science. Indiana artists and those residing within 200 miles of Evansville were eligible to submit entries for this juried exhibition. During the exhibit, the painting was purchased for the corporate collection of Bristol-Myers Hillsdale, NJ.
