KCLC BOARD OF CONTROL FORMED

President Jim Spainhower has created the KCLC Board of Control, a six-member group that has direct control of the college's community radio station. The board eventually will control all operations, personnel, budget, programming and utilization of KCLC for academic, community service, development, fundraising and public relations aspects of the station. Formation of the board is designed to improve efficiency and effectiveness of the station, to make it more financially self-sufficient and to improve Lindenwood marketing.

Chairman of the newly-formed board is James G. Maurer, manager of community relations for Southwestern Bell Telephone. Other board members include Vice-President of Academic Affairs Dan Keck, Vice-President for Finance Ken Musbach, President Spainhower, Director of Development Jim Thompson and Public Relations Director Randy L. Wallick. Others may be added in the future.

COLLEGE PHONE NUMBER CHANGED

With the availability of a new telephone extension for the St. Charles area, Lindenwood has changed its number to 949-2000, effective immediately. The new number is a more marketable one that will be more easily recognized and remembered. The old number, 946-6912, automatically will be forwarded to the new one during the next 12 months. College offices and departments should begin upgrading their materials to reflect the new telephone number so that the old 946 extension can be phased out shortly.

DIRECTOR OF EVENING & CORPORATE ADMISSIONS

Marsha Parker of St. Charles, former head of personnel and volunteer services for the St. Charles City-County Library, has been named Director of Evening & Corporate Admissions. A 1971 graduate of Lindenwood, she received an M.F.A. in theatre this spring, and is well-known in the community for her theatrical performances at Lindenwood.

Prior to her 1978 appointment with the library, she served as deputy juvenile officer for the 11th Judicial Circuit in St. Charles, as director of volunteers for the St. Louis State School and Hospital, and for a year as a teacher at Duchesne High School. In addition, she has assisted the Admissions Office at Lindenwood as a graduate assistant in recruiting.

SIBLEY DESCENDENT VISITS LINDENWOOD

Robert Easton, the great-great grandson of Mary Sibley's father, Rufus, visited the Lindenwood campus for the first time recently. The 57-year-old Easton has amassed more than 40 years in show business as a Hollywood character actor and a renowned dialect expert. He has made more than 600 appearances on radio and more than 800 on television in addition to starring in 62 major motion pictures. In recent years Easton has coached Hollywood and European stars, including Gregory Peck, Sir Laurence Olivier, Charlton Heston, Jane Fonda, Ann-Margaret, Al Pacino, Sissy Spacek and Robert De Niro, to name a few.

During his visit, Easton toured the campus, visited the Sibley Hall Museum, had lunch with President Spainhower, scanned records in the College Archives, spent several hours with Public Relations Director Randy L. Wallick and visited his relatives' graves at Founders Cemetery on campus. Mary Sibley was Easton's great-great grandaunt.

From an interview that will be published in the fall issue of the LINDEN WORD, Easton said, "This is a beautiful campus, something you don't find in California. But, what is more impressive is the friendliness of this campus and of those I have met at Lindenwood. You have a unique, warm and beautiful college," he continued, "something my ancestors would have been proud of."
