When one views the passing show one notes with interest the increasing number of parts that are being acted by women. This is, of course, interesting to us. Our old, venerated, and precious articles of incorporation which made Lindenwood a part of the "body politic," which means a part of the commonwealth of the state, set forth institutional purposes. Among those purposes is preparation for "useful living." Two forms of "useful living" are designated by way of illustration. They are "Christian motherhood" and employment as "school teachers." That is a brief, albeit an important, list of useful occupations for women. The writers of our charter never dreamed of the varied opportunities that beckon college women today. Much less could they foretell the forceful demands now made on women as citizens to work in dozens of occupations. "Useful living" thereby becomes a patriotic service.

Women workers in various fields have never been so effective and never so much needed as they are today. There is reason to believe that women are at their best today as they take part not as women but as fellow citizens in all affairs of vital interest and importance to the American people. A recent issue of The Manchester Guardian reveals woman "transcending the sex approach altogether" as "she plays her part on the plane of general politics." Woman is most influential now, says the Guardian, because she is "most a member of Parliament and least a women's representative." Assurance of a similar position for women in politics and in all the affairs of life is one permanent good which may issue in England and America from the present war. Women will get a job and hold a position not because they are women and not in recognition of that fact, but because they can do the job and hold the position.

Mathematics and physics have not in past years attracted many women students in high school and college. The difficulty of such courses has frightened

many students away from them. The fear has been increased because girls have been told and have comto believe that they could not do sums and laborator experiments. The result has been that surveys of interests of college students show that women place occupations requiring mathematics, statistics, mechanical dexterity and space sense at the very bottom of the list of choices. Men place these occupations at the to So far as ability goes there is no reason why this should be so. Women by native endowment are not limited to choice of nursing, art, fashion design, home economic and secretarial work. Some recent tests show that women excel men in the clerical speed, reasoning, est mating, computing, report writing, and verbal resource necessary for engineering. Deficiencies in knowledge of mathematics and in space sense are thought to be due to lack of interest and consequently lack of exercise of the number and space senses.

At mid-year six seniors—Lorraine Allen, Dera Greer, Bertha Jauch, Louise Olson, Gloria Stunkl and Mary Jane Tarling—completed requirements in graduation. They have left the campus and we min them; but they will return for Commencement in June A few other students also dropped out or transferred to other colleges at mid-year. Their places have been taken by new registrants. So we have a full house.

It is apparent now that we shall have full occupancy of our dormitories next September. Our life as work will proceed with a fair degree of normally Lindenwood will be on the alert to meet every deman for patriotic service. However, the efficient workings our program will be neither interrupted nor disrupte by the war in which we with all of our fellow citizen are engaged. 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# Margaret Bourke-White, Noted War Photographer, Speaks at Lindenwood

Other Features Announced for Spring Program on the Campus — Miss Angna Enters to Present Sketches on March 5

M ISS Margaret Bourke-White, world famous photographer and the first woman to be accredited as a war correspondent with the United States Air Force, visited Lindenwood on February 23 and told of her experiences in photographing the war in an address in Roemer Auditorium. She revealed for the first time that she made history in Tunisia recently by becoming the first woman to ever accompany a bombing force on a raid over enemy territory.

Miss Bourke-White, who is covering the war for Life magazine, was sent to England last August and was with the American bombing forces there until she went to North Africa. En route the troop ship on which she was traveling was torpedoed and she was rescued after spending eight hours in a lifeboat.

In North Africa she accompanied a task force of Flying Fortresses on a raid on Tunis and spent some time at an advanced airport in southern Tunisia near the scene of much of the recent fighting. She gave a vivid first-hand picture of the war in her address at Lindenwood and stressed the part women can play in winning the war.

Miss Bourke-White's lecture is but one feature of the interesting spring program at Lindenwood. Recently Paul Engle, the noted poet, visited the campus and made several addresses.

On March 5 Miss Angna Enters will present an evening's program of original sketches, assisted by Kurt Adler at the piano. Miss Enters is the author of "First Person Plural," "Love Possessed Juana" and "Silly Girl," which is to be published this year.

Other events will be announced for the remainder of the semester.

Of special interest to the alumnae will be Alumnae Day on Saturday, June 5. Plans for the entertainment of the alumnae include a buffet supper at which there will be greetings from Dr. Gage, the president of the Alumnae Association and others, and a program in Roemer Auditorium that night.

The commencement speaker will be Dr. Alice C. Lloyd, dean of women at the University of Michigan. The baccalaureate sermon will be preached on Sunday, June 6, by Dr. George Arthur Frantz, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Indianapolis, Ind.



Miss Barbara Ann Clifton, of Indianapolis, Ind., will begin a six months internship at Mt. Sinai Hospital in Philadelphia on March 1, and will then be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the WAACs. She attended Lindenwood in 1940 and 1941 and last December received a degree in dietetics from Purdue University.

In a recent letter to Mr. Motley she wrote: "I give Lindenwood credit for my foundation work at Purdue. All my credits were accepted without any difficulty. I hope to get back to Lindenwood some day, for there will always be a warm spot in my heart for dear old L.C."

Miss Margaret Patterson, Class of '27, is aiding the war effort by helping stimulate an interest in science in high schools and colleges as membership secretary of the Science Clubs of America. She is in the Washington headquarters of Science Service.

The Science Clubs of America, she writes "are fostering the spread of good science teaching by means of science clubs in secondary schools, colleges and universities. An annual feature of our program is the 'Science Talent Search.' This year we have 3,400 participants among high school seniors and the program will result in our finding many promising young scientists. America needs them trained as rapidly as possible if we are to win the war—and the peace."
