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COLLEGE ALCOHOL POLICY ADOPTED

The college's Executive Committee has adopted the following policy on alcoholic beverages, effective immediately.

Lindenwood College does not possess a liquor license, therefore, alcoholic beverages cannot be sold on campus or at the college's off-campus centers.

The serving of alcoholic beverages at any college function is discouraged. However, for those receptions, open houses, theatre events, dinners, etc., at which alcoholic beverages are served, only wine, beer or champagne punch may be used. Any department or office which feels it is necessary to serve alcoholic beverages must make this request to the President's Executive Committee for approval in advance of the event. Any alcoholic beverages which are served must be complimentary, and are not part of the purchase price of any ticket.

The use of alcoholic beverages by students and at student functions is governed by this policy and additional regulations issued by the Office of Programs and Residences.

JOINS ADMISSIONS STAFF
