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LINDENWOOD RECEIVES ACCREDITATION UNTIL 1994

The North Central Association of Colleges & Schools (NCACS) has granted continued accreditation to Lindenwood until 1984, the maximum that can be received by the Chicago-based accrediting body. "This accreditation is quite an accomplishment by the college," said President Jim Spainhower, "and it is indicative of the continuing value of a degree from this 160-year-old institution."

According to Jim Hood, former dean of faculty who served as coordinator for the NCACS study, "the accrediting team gave us high marks for our academic program. In fact," he added, "in every NCACS evaluation we've had recently, the association has never knocked our academic program, always saying that the

college is a high-quality, liberal arts institution."

With member institutions in 19 states, the NCACS covers the largest portion of the United States as an official accrediting body. It has granted accredi-

tation to Lindenwood since 1918.
