McKISSACK COLLECTION OF CHILDREN'S LITERATURE OPENS

The Patricia C. McKissack Collection of Black Children's Literature opens September 27 with a permanent display at Butler Library. The collection of books is by, for and about black Americans, including original art and working papers by McKissack, a well-known author and educator. The collection is made possible by a continuing grant from Book Lures, Inc., of O'Fallon.

ceremonies begin at 3 p.m.

DEANS' RESPONSIBILITIES INCREASE

Effective October 1, Allen Schwab, dean of the Undergraduate College, and Arlene Taich, dean of Undergraduate Studies and Evening & Corporate Programs, will assume responsibility for certain administrative activities which previ-

ously have been handled by the Dean of Faculty.

Both Schwab and Taich will be responsible for (1) acting upon applications for readmission, (2) acting upon Requests for Policy Exemptions according to established policies, (3) acting upon requests for incomplete grades, (4) acting upon recommendations for grade changes, (5) acting upon appeals of academic suspension, and (6) certifying satisfactory academic progress on tuition waiver forms.

Schwab will have responsibility for these administrative activities for Day College students, both full and part-time, while Taich will have the responsibility for them as they concern Evening College, LCIE and, where appropriate, graduate students.

REGIONAL HUMANITIES WORKSHOP SET

Lindenwood will host a regional workshop on funding opportunities for institutions of higher learning October 22 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on campus. Blanche L. Premo, deputy director of the Division of Research Programs of the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), will present the session. She will discuss NEH programs with special emphasis on research, fellowship and education programs and on the preparation of grant proposals for colleges and universities. \$20,000 GIFT FROM RALSTON PURINA

Lindenwood has received a contribution of \$6,667 from John L. Lenza, manager of the Contributions Program for Ralston Purina Co. The unrestricted gift is the first installment in a three-year pledge of \$20,000 made by the St. Louisbased firm. In announcing the gift, President James I. Spainhower expressed the college's appreciation to Lenza and to William P. Stiritz, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Ralston Purina Co. The money will be earmarked to the general fund to be used for scholarship assistance, facilities improvement and campus renovation and repair.
