BOB DYER TO PERFORM OCTOBER 23

Well-known Missouri folk singer and storyteller Bob Dyer will perform October 23 at 7:30 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre. Sponsored by the LSG and Lectures & Concerts Committee, the presentation is free to all faculty, staff and students as well as the public.

A native of Boonville, Dyer has written many original songs and poems relating to the history, people and landscape of Missouri. An historian, Dyer for the past 10 years has been writing and performing original songs in the folk ballad modes and, since 1980, has been part of the Missouri Arts Council's Artists-in-Education program, presenting workshops and assemblies throughout the state.

Gormley studied design, painting and sculpture at Connecticut College for Women and Transylvania College in Kentucky before graduating from Lindenwood in 1967. LIVE KCLC BROADCASTS THIS WEEK AT MID RIVERS MALL

Lindenwood's community radio station, KCLC-FM, will be broadcasting live during grand-opening festivities this week at Mid Rivers Mall in St. Peters. The station, which recently witnessed a power increase from 1,500 to 25,500 watts, will be at the lower level of the mall Wednesday through Sunday, broadcasting live from 10 a.m. until 9:30 p.m. each day. As part of the promotion, KCLC will be giving away a gift certificate for Dillard's and two \$50 gold coins provided by Famous-Barr.

The mall, which opens to the public at 10 a.m. tomorrow, features 100 shops, including Dillard's, Famous-Barr and a six-screen cinema. A week of activities is planned during the mall's grand-opening festivities, including giveaways such as four \$1,000 shopping sprees, a trip on the Danube River in Europe and a new car from Terry Fisher Buick. Lindenwood will participate in a preview Grand Opening Celebration tonight at which President Jim Spainhower will make a public announcement of Lindenwood's 160th anniversary. He also will receive a check for \$10,000 for the Performing Arts Dept., courtesy of May Centers, Inc., mall developers. The \$10,000 stems from proceeds from ticket sales for the gala event.

SUBMIT YOUR PREDICTIONS FOR GINKGO DAY II UPCOMING!

An event which unexpectedly took Lindenwood by storm in 1986 is now a tradition, says Joe Arnold. Ginkgo Day II will take place after the campus' three ginkgo trees lose their leaves in the span of a few hours. The fall phenomenon was popularized last year by ginkgo fever with leaves worn as leis and crowns and exchanged among students as symbols of friendship and perservance. "When the Lady Lions took the field at the national soccer championships last fall, ginkgo leaves were with them," Arnold adds.

Students are invited to submit the date when the leaves day will drop, and the winner who picks the correct date (hint - last year, it was November 13) will win a \$50 cash prize courtesy of President Spainhower. Ballots are due by October 21, and they can be submitted to Ginkgo Box 51.

A bigger and better celebration is planned for Ginkgo Day II, complete with ginkgo cookies, ginkgo cider, the famous Ginkgo Leaf Toss, the Ginkgo Leaf Fight, proclamations by Missouri Gov. John Ashcroft and St. Charles Mayor Grace Nichols and the traditional crowning of the Ginkgo King and Queen.

According to Arnold, Ginkgo Day chairman, "The Ginkgo tree is one of the oldest in North America, and it is known for its hardiness and its ability to withstand less than favorable conditions. This type of perservance and beauty are extremely similar to the Lindenwood spirit which has endured through good and bad times at this institution for 160 years."
