## LOYOLA UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR TO SPEAK

A public discussion on censorship will be led by George Anastaplo, professor of law at the Loyola University of Chicago Law School, is scheduled from 3:30-4:30 p.m. November 19 in the Goodall Parlor of the MAB. Students, faculty and staff can pick up free copies of Professor Anastaplo's article on censorship, published in the 1986 ENCYCLOPEDIA BRITANNICA, at the Circulation Desk of Butler Library.

Later at 7:30 p.m. in Young Hall Auditorium, he will present a lecture and discussion, "First Amendments Rights in a Technological Society." Anastaplo is a lecturer in liberal arts at the University of Chicago and professor emeritus of political science at Rosary College in River Forest, IL. Both presentations, which are open to the community without charge, are co-sponsored by Lindenwood and the St. Charles' Constitution Bicentennial Committee. The programs are supported by the Missouri Humanities Council (MHC), the state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Lindenwood's All-College Reading List Committee applied for and received a small grant from the MHC to bring Anastaplo to the campus. The grant enables the college to join the Bicentennial Committee in joint sponsorship of this event.

## CONGRATULATIONS TO MEN'S, WOMEN'S SOCCER TEAMS

The Lindenwood community salutes the men's and women's soccer teams this fall, both of which have qualified for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 16 playoffs. Under Coach Scott Westbrook, the Lions are 11-5-2 for the season, and begin playoff today against Missouri Southern State College. The Lady Lions, coached by Debbie Kehm, are 12-2-2 for the regular season, and begin playoff later this week against Missouri Valley College in District 16 action.
