ART FACULTY REPRESENTED IN GUILD EXHIBIT

Five members of the art faculty are represented in "Faculty '87," an invitational exhibition now through December 10 at the St. Louis Artists' Guild in Webster Groves. Faculty members are Dean Eckert, chairman and professor of art; Mark A. Fisher and Nancy Follis, adjunct instructors; Hans Levi, associate professor of art; and John H. Wehmer, professor of art. The five are among more than 80 artists/instructors selected for single exhibits in varied media. The one-month exhibit is represented by 16 colleges and universities throughout the metro area.

In an unrelated showing, Eckert is one of 82 artists selected from among nearly 600 to exhibit at the "1987 Biennial," an all-media show taking place November 22 through January 3 at the Sioux City (IA) Art Center. His acrylic is among works of art from an eight-state area represented at the exhibit.

In another show, Levi is exhibiting 40 color and black-and-white images in a one-person show in November at the Art Center in Astabula, OH.

These can include professional articles, textbooks and workbooks, cassette tape scripts, transparency masters, filmstrips and computer programs.

According to Nancy Polette, assistant professor and EWI director, "When a student's work reaches publishable quality, cooperating publishers have agreed to give the work consideration.
