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LINDENWOOD SELECTED FOR SOVIET EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Lindenwood is one of 10 colleges and universities in the country selected to participate in a student-exchange program that may bring a delegation of Soviet students to the campus next year. Initiated entirely by the LSG, the program will involve a group of Lindenwood students and faculty spending a week at a university in the U.S.S.R. and a group of Soviet students spending a week at Lindenwood.

"The exchange program is the first ever to pair American and Soviet universities for reciprocal exchange of undergraduate students from all academic disciplines," said Ron Watermon, LSG president and coordinator of the exchange program. "It is an invaluable introduction to the U.S.S.R. and an opportunity to

meet counterparts face to face," he added.

Faculty advisor of the program is C. Edward Balog, chairman and professor of history and a member of St. Charles City Council. Students who will participate have not been selected yet. The program is co-sponsored by the Citizen Exchange Council of New York City and the Soviet Student Council, and is modeled after a 1985 program at Yale University.

Watermon said there is a 3-year commitment to the exchange program and an annual budget cost of \$20-\$30,000. "The LSG currently is in the process of fund raising, and it hopes to gain both corporate and philanthropic support from throughout the metro area," he said. LINDENWOOD PROJECT WINS NATIONAL AWARD

Lindenwood instructors, students and graduates played a major role in a training video that recently won a national award. "The 5-Minute Call," a 20-minute film produced by Monsanto to help United Way solicitors ask for contributions from employees, received a special National Award for training by the United Way. Many area firms saw the film and used it in-house in one of the most succesful United Way campaigns in history. "The 5-Minute Call," which Monsanto is using once again this year, uses movie and television vignettes to show how not to ask for contributions.

LCIE instuctor and faculty advisor Peter Carlos, a producer, director and screenwriter for Master Productions, directed and technically-produced the program. Carlos has won two Emmys and a Flair Award for his work in television and corporate video, and his documentary students won the first student Emmy three years ago. 1986 LCIE graduate Gene McCoskey, conference facility supervisor at Monsanto, co-produced and co-wrote the script. Jennifer Luner, an Evening Col-

lege instructor in organizational communications and a training manager at

Monsanto, spearheaded the project.

Also involved were Carole Knight, a 1988 graduate in communications who is floor director at KMOV-TV, who served as Carlos' assistant director, and Lynne Landholt, formerly of the Development Office and an LCIE graduate student, who was production assistant and an extra in the film. Contel employee and LCIE student Cindy Shelley and producer/actor Mark Doll portrayed Monsanto employees in the video. Last year, "The 5-Minute Call" won a local United Way award for an outstanding program.
