

Botany is Fascinating Subject at Lindenwood

Students in Dr. Marion Dawson's Botany Classes Develop "Seeing Eye" on Field Trips and Learn Gardening in College Greenhouse By Dr. Marion Dawson

"I TOW do I transplant my philodendron? Shall I I I use Zoom? Are these geranium cuttings ready for potting? Could I water my fern with a plant food solution? What shall I do with these bulbs that are through blooming?"

These and many other questions are heard each day as busy groups of Lindenwood girls learn as they work in the college greenhouse.

It would be difficult to measure the joy and interest that a year of training in botany gives to a large number of students. Frequent field trips develop a "seeing eye" as well as a thorough knowledge of the growing things everywhere around them. This spring, after the final field exam which covered more than two hundred species of native and cultivated trees, shrubs, and herbaceous plants, several girls were heard to remark with great pride, "Well, I knew one hundred and seventy-five of them. Four months ago I was lucky to identify a maple correctly, much less give the correct species."

Learning the names of plants is only a small part of the training this course affords. Several weeks are given over to an enthusiastic study of the art of Flower Arrangement. A number of exhibits are staged in order that each girl may have the opportunity to plan, order, and finally arrange flowers for breakfasts, luncheons, dinners, and teas. The tables, lovely to the last detail, are enjoyed by the entire student body. This past year, J. Gregory Conway, foremost authority in the art of Flower Arrangement, lectured to the group and was welcomed with high enthusiasm.

The greenhouse, a seventy-five foot unit, is a beehive of activity from September to June. A visit any day will disclose these things: a group learning how to make cuttings and experimenting with the relatively new plant auxins which stimulate root development; another group transplanting, carefully mixing the proper soils, using Zoom, a vitamin B1 product which checks root shock. Or there is the possibility that you may find a student carefully preparing solutions of plant foods for the plants growing in Hydroponds, or in other special pots adapted for water culture.

During the dreary winter months the greenhouse is a favorite mecca for every Lindenwood girl, for it houses a fine collection of bulbs as well as a large and colorful collection of house plants and annuals. The culture and care of these plants is a part of each student's training.

Spring days are devoted to the preparation of annual and perennial borders in the trial plot adjoining the greenhouse. The final and most exciting project concerns the execution of a landscape plan. Each girl measures her home property, draws it to scale, and then prepares a landscape plan involving proper foundation and screen plantings, trees, bulb, annual and perennial borders, a rose garden, an outdoor living room space, a rock garden, or any other landscape feature she may

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Dr. Gage Is Honored by Cedar Rapids Rotary Club

Dr. Harry Morehouse Gage, Lindenwood's new president, was presented with a diamond-studded Rotary Club pin by members of the Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Rotary Club, of which he is a past president, on May 26. The presentation was made by W. R. Boyd, a member of the Board of Trustees of Coe College. Citing Dr. Gage's service as president of Coe College and as a citizen in that community, Mr. Boyd said in part:

"Dr. Gage possesses a genius for friendship. He draws men to him in bonds of friendship and esteem as unconsciously as a flower gives its perfume to the air. He is at home in almost all places, and under almost all circumstances. Why? Because he is a genuine lover of his kind. He understands people. He knows their thoughts, their feelings, their reactions. He possesses in large measure a sense without which I cannot understand how men exist—a sense of humor. He can always see the humorous side of things. He has the power to relieve a tense situation by an apt joke, or a story that just fits.

"Perhaps he is never so welcome and so effective as in times of trouble. He can come into a house which death has entered and speak such words of comfort as rob death of its sting. In like manner, he can come to those who have suffered misfortune of various kinds and lift them up and start them on their way again hopefully. He has even softened the shadows of grim prison walls. He has been to this community not only a guide in all things spiritual—he has been a benediction, a healing and an inspiring influence always.

"It may be noted that I have not spoken of Dr. Gage as the great college president, who knows all the notable figures in higher education in America, and who is known and honored by them. Nor have I mentioned his learning, his culture, his eloquence, nor sought to enumerate the academic honors which have come to him. These will be elaborated upon by others on other occasions,

"Dr. Gage, it is beyond my power to describe what you have been to this community. Fortunately it is not necessary that anyone should adequately describe it. The community instinctively feels and knows what you have meant to it since you came to bless it with your presence and with your ministrations, your culture, your learning, your adaptability, your allembracing friendliness. Long will the memory of you linger. You have been precious beyond words, and as

you go away from us physically, but not in spirit, we bid you God-speed and wish for you and yours the fulfillment of every desire of your and their hearts."
