SURVEY RESULTS COMPILED

Results of the Communication Survey distributed by the students in PR show that most students obtain the information they need through word of mouth, posters around campus and campus publications, respectively.

According to those surveyed:

The rate of readership among the campus publications is:

48% rated Communique first

21% rated LindenWorld first

20% rated the write-in "Subway Express" first

11% rated LindenWord first

More student interest material, a speakout column, more campus news and feature articles were requested by responding students.

The survey also reported that the majority of Lindenwood students do not listen to KCLC AM or FM.

The survey was distributed to full-time day students to determine the effectiveness of campus communications.
