Dr. John Moore, sponsor of the Democratic group at Lindenwood, has stated his views in another article. When Dr. S. A. E. Betz. sponsor of the Republicans, was asked to comment on why he thought they should win the 1952 election, he issued the following statement:

"I believe that the Republicans will win the 1952 election because the momentum of leadership is no longer with the Democrats, and because the philosophy of the Democratic Party-despite the undoubtedly good intentions of many Democrats-has increasingly tended to obscure and undermine certain basic American ideals. I refer to such things as thrift, civic forthrightness, and the independence of the individual. The American people are increasingly looking to the Republican Party for a renascence of these ideals and for fresh vigorous leadership."

Danish Educator Speaks At Convo

Dr. Peter Manniche, and principal of the International People's College at Elsinore, Denmark, spoke at convocation Thursday on the subject "Education Toward International Understanding.

Dr. Manniche has lectured extensively in the United States under the auspices of the Institute of International Education, and in Canada for the National Council He has also lecof Education. tured at the Universities of London, Manchester, Oxford, Cambridge, Bristol, and Toronto, and several universities in China. October, 1947, he served as Dan-ish delegate to the UNESCO Conference in Mexico City. In 1951 he served as a visiting European consultant to the Office of the United States High Commissioner nany. Among Dr. Man-publications are "Denin Germany. A Social Laboratory" and 'Adult Education in the Struggle for Peace.

The International People's College was founded at Elsinore, Denmark, in 1921 by Dr. Manniche in collaboration with Mr. Hegermann - Lindencrone, whose father was Danish Ambassador to the United States. Over the years this College has had some 4,800 students for the five months' winter course and three months' summer course, and another 8,500 students for the short Forty-four difvacation courses. ferent nations have been represented in the student body, and more than half have come from countries other than Denmark.




