Dr. John Moore, sponsor of the Democratic group at Lindenwood, has stated his views in another ar ticle. When Dr. S. A. E. Betz sponsor of the Republicans, was sked to comment on why he hought they should win the 1952 election, he issued the following statement:
"I believe that the Republicans will win the 1952 election because the momentum of leadership is no longer with the Democrats, and because the philosophy of the Democratic Party-despite the undoubtedly good intentions of many Democrats-has increasingly tended to obscure and undermine certain basic American ideals. 1 refer to such things as thrift, civic forthrightness, and the independence of the individual. The American people are increasingly looking to the Republican Party for a renascence of these ideals and for fresh vigorous leadership."

## Dr. Moore, Democratic <br> Sponsor, Airs His Views <br> On Coming Election

Why shouldn't the Democrat ocratic Club of Lindenwoo College backing them? In an interview with Dr. John B. Moore sponsor of the Democratic party or the spring political convention the values of such a convention were discussed, and his opinions on the national campaign were gained.

When asked just what were the values of an L.C. student's partic pation in helping with the plan ning, preparation and actually working at the convention, Dr Moore believed that the convention would be a valuable experience for the following reasons: (1) it creates an interest. (2) it acquaints the student with problems in or ganization, and (3) it is trainin or good citizenship.
As to the issues involved in such campaign and how will the Dem ocrats stand on the issues, Dr Moore thought that the bigges battles would be over economic policies and what our foreign pol icy should be. However moral
in public life will be discussed and taxes (that ever pertinent subject for any presidential campaign) will be hashed out.
As to what side of the fence the Democrats will be on we can get a pretty good idea from the policies already in effect in the present administration. The Democrats will stand on the issue of a arge national income and the coninuance of the present high tandard of living. Dr. Moore believes that the "foreign policy will receive consideration by both parchanged " changed. Taxes will be pounced on "in order to get votes, but whoever wins-the taxes will go up." When questioned as to why the girls should vote the Democratic licket, Dr. Moore said that the Democrats have a better economic policy than the Republicans and also because of our present foreign policy."
As to who the candidate for the party is likely to be, Dr. Moore doesn't know yet. But it is up to us at our convention to decide the one that we want

## Speaks At Convo

Dr. Peter Manniche, founder and principal of the International People's College at Elsinore, Denmark, spoke at convocation last Thursday on the subject "Educa tion Toward International Under standing."
Dr. Manniche has lectured ex tensively in the United States under the auspices of the Institute of International Education, and in Canada for the National Counci of Education. He has also lectured at the Universities of London, Manchester, Oxford, Cam bridge. Bristol, and Toronto, and several universities in China. In October, 1947, he served as Dan ish delegate to the UNESCO Conference in Mexico City. In 195 he served as a visiting European consultant to the Office of the United States High Commissioner in Germany. Among Dr. Man niche's publications are "Denmark: A Social Laboratory" and "Adult Education in the Struggle for Peace."
The International People's Col lege was founded at Elsinore Denmark, in 1921 by Dr. Man niche in collaboration with Mr Cai Hegermann - Lindencrone whose father was Danish Ambas sador to the United States. Over the years this College has had some 4,800 students for the five months' winter course and three months winter course and thre other 8.500 students for the shor vacation courses. Forty-four dif ferent nations have been repre sented in the student body, an more than half have come from countries other than Denmark

KCLC HAS NEW MOVIE CAMERA FOR USE OF PRODUCTION CLASS AS PREPARATION FOR TELEVISION STUDYCOMMERCIALS ARE FIRST PROJECTS

KCLC now has a new movie camera to brag about. The camera, which is a 16 mm Belle \& Howell, arrived last week and the production class got its first lesson in the technique of movie making last Tuesday. The camera is mounted on a tripod and can be adjusted to take pictures from any angle. An additional aid to making good pictures is a light meter, which registers the amount of light and then gives the corresponding number at which to set the camera lens. The equipment also included two portable lights. The current in these lights can be stepped up so as to give the voltage of floodlights.
The class was given a chance to go through the motions of making a picture, i. e. loading the camera, making the necessary adjustments. taking the light reading, focusing
the camera, and setting up the subject with correct lighting. The whole process is complicated and will take practice to get it down "pat."
One of the first projects which the class will do along this line is the making of short commercial films. There is some discussion about the possibility of having Saturday class because regular class hours are so short.
