SWIFT APPOINTED

Dr. James Swift has been appointed chairperson of the Business Administration Department and Director of the Babcock Center for the Study of Management and Communication, Dr. Swift, who has been a member of the Lindenwood faculty since 1984, holds degrees from Pomona College, the University of Chicago, the University of Colorado, and Washington University from which he received his Ph.D. in Sociology. Siebels has been the Director of Recreational Programs for Lakeside Center for Boys and coached men's basketball at MOBAP in the 70s.

A member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 16 executive committee, Siebels was elected the first president of the newly-formed Show-Me Collegiate Conference in

1986. He was president of the Ozark Collegiate Conference from 1983-85.

SWIFT ATTENDS FORUM ON EDUCATION

Wilda Swift, assistant director of development for Lindenwood, attended the conference "An American Forum on Education and International Competence" held in St. Louis from May 13 through May 16. The conference was attended by more than 1,000 educators, government officials and business representatives from throughout the United States and Canada.

Plenary sessions of the conference were addressed by Chester Finn, assistant secretary of the U.S. Department of Education; Mylle Bell, director of corporate planning for BellSouth Corporation; Missouri Governor John Ashcroft; Ohio Governor Richard F. Celeste; Kenneth Liebler, president and chief operating officer of the American Stock Exchange; Maitland Stobart, deputy director of education, culture and sport at the Council of Europe; Glegg L. Watson, manager for urban affairs/higher education at Xerox Corporation and others.

The conference was sponsored by more than twenty organizations, including the National Governors' Association, the Foreign Policy Association, the Education Commission of the States, the World History Association, the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the Council of Chief State School Officers, and the National Council of World Affairs.

State caucuses met to discuss ways elementary and secondary schools, colleges and universities could work with organizations from the corporate, cultural and social communities to improve students' abilities to move gracefully and intelligently in a global context.
