LEARNING FOREIGN LANGUAGE IS FUN--

--especially when it's a Russian lesson from Adjı Djayandaru, vice president of the orientation committee for Project Peace.

Beginning with this issue, "Communique" will run a brief Russian lesson every week. This is part of the orientation for Project Peace, the U.S./Soviet Student Exchange Program between Lindenwood and Azerbaijan State University in Baku.

Adjı's lessons will include the Russian spelling plus the phoetic pronunciation in parentheses and the English translation.

Lesson One - Introduction:

Bukmon (Viktor) = male's name

Anna (Ana) = female's name

Kak baw zabym? (Kak vas zavut?) = What's your name?

Menia zobym Bukmon. (Menya zavut Victor.) = My name is Victor.

Menia zobym Anna. (Menya zavut Ana.) = My name is Anna.

RICKERT LECTURES IN EUROPE

Richard Rickert, director of the International Valuation Sciences Institute at Lindenwood Col-

lege will be in Europe to address personnel of the American Appraisal Associates. Scheduled for September 5 through 12, the presentations will be on Value Theory and Valuation Sciences. Professor Rickert will travel to Madrid, Milan, Rome and London, where he will also review appraisal resources and the international implications of the impending elimination of tariff boundaries in the European Economic Community.

Following his overseas travels, Rickert will travel to Dallas where he will be part of an MB Valuation Services seminar. Other members of the Lindenwood International Valuation Sciences Institute who will address this seminar are: Ernest Demba, ASA, MAI, adjunct professor at LC and Edward Raether, a vice president of American Appraisal Associates and a student in the LC Valuation Sciences program.

Officers of American Appraisal Associates and of MB Valuation Services are enrolled in the International Valuation Sciences degree program at Lindenwood. The two corporations have donated nearly \$10,000 in funding, library resources, computer software and services for the college's Valuation Sciences program.

KELLOGG FOUNDATION LOOKS FOR LEADERS

The Kellogg Foundation is looking for 50 professional men and women who currently have leadership potential and are in the early years of their careers. The 1989 Fellowship award for such leaders includes \$35,000 over three years for the completion of the learning plan and \$5,000 for travel expenses incurred while participating in seven seminars. Salary reimbursement is also provided for the 25% work release time. Application deadline is December 19, 1988. A group show of all artists who have shown their works at the U. City Library Gallery during the 1980's is currently on exhibit there. Levi's work is included in this exhibition.

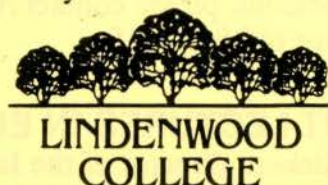
