Kaskowitz Lectures on Third Parties in American Politics

Dorothy Kaskowitz, organizer and founder of the Organized Independents political group, will speak on "Third Parties in American Politics" on Tuesday, November 1 at 7 p.m. in Young Auditorium. Kaskowitz's lecture is being presented by the Lindenwood Lectures and Concerts Committee and is open to the general public.

Kaskowitz, a graduate of Washington University, began her political career in 1968 in support of Senator Eugene McCarthy.

She is again supporting McCarthy in his bid for the 1988 presidency. McCarthy is running on the Consumer Party ticket.

Kaskowitz believes third parties in American politics are "important to the political life of the country."

"Only by talking and listening to one another can we make use of the political parties instead of them being permitted to use us, and many times divide us to serve their own ends," said Kaskowitz.

What's New In Soviet Schools?

Susan Williams, Russian language adjunct instructor, will tell us "What's New In The Soviet Schools," in a special presentation on November 8 at the Butler Library Night Owl Nook from noon to 1 p.m.

Williams has traveled extensively in the U.S.S.R. and has given private lessons in the Russian language. She received her bachelor's degree in political science from Washington University and her master's in Russian language and literature from Indiana University. Williams currently teaches Russian at Crossroads School. She has taught social studies at the secondary level in several school districts.

This summer, Williams was one of 20 U.S. participants in a joint U.S./Soviet Institute on "New Ways of Thinking and Teaching About Each Other." She has written curriculum materials on Women in the U.S.S.R. for the St. Louis public schools and has developed other educational materials on the Soviet Union and other topics.


