High Tech Speeds Reference Services at Butler Library

Students, Are you are gearing up for final papers? If you are, the College library has the perfect opportunity for you.

For the next 30 days only, Butler Library will offer the state-of-the-art in high technology to speed patron reference services. A new computer system, called ACADEMIC INDEX on InfoTrac allows patrons in seconds to search three years of issues of more than 375 magazines and the most recent six months of The New York Times for articles written on a specific topic. The listings of relevant articles are displayed on the computer screen and all or any parts of the listings can be printed out for future reference.

Each article description contains the headline of the article; the name of the publication in which it appeared; the author's name, if the article is by-lined; the page number on which the article begins, and its length.

"I encourage students, staff and faculty to come to the library and try the system firsthand," said Head Librarian Jan Czapla. "This is a wonderful opportunity for everyone to use in the next 30 days."

According to Czapla, most patrons do not require instruction in the use of the InfoTrac system and much of the information that is being sought today relates to very timely subjects. In dynamic areas such as technology, science, the arts, politics, and consumer affairs, magazines and newspapers are primary sources of current information.

Is Chemistry Hard, Or Not?

To help students succeed in the Concepts of Chemistry course, Professor Moheb Nasr will hold an open workshop called, "Is Chemistry Hard, Or Not?" The workshop will be held on Wednesday, November 16 from 2:00 to 3:00 in Young Lounge. This workshop is intended for students planning to enroll in CHM 111 in the Spring '89 Term; however, all students are welcome to attend.

Some questions Professor Nasr will address include: Why do I need a Chemistry Class? Should I have Chemistry before Biology? What math background is needed and expected in the class? Is the Concepts course for scientists or not? How can I get ready before the class starts? What skills are needed for studying Chemistry and for succeeding on quizzes and exams?
