College Appoints Siebels Athletic Director

Arthur R. Siebels has been appointed Athletic Director at Lindenwood College. Siebels, who has been serving as Associate Athletic Director since his arrival at Lindenwood last June, began his new duties on February 1. He also coaches men's basketball and will coach the men's baseball team in their initial season beginning in 1990.

Bringing fifteen years of coaching and administrative experience to the Lindenwood position, Siebels served four years in a similiar capacity at Missouri Baptist College in Creve Coeur and eleven years at Columbia College in Columbia, Mo. He earned a bachelor of science degree from Southeast Missouri State and holds a masters of education degree from the University of Arizona. He is currently a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 16 Executive Committee.

Siebels is a past president of the Ozark Collegiate Conference and was the first president of the newly formed Show-me Collegiate Conference, of which Lindenwood is a charter member. (Submitted by Allen Schwab, dean of the undergraduate college.)

President Comments On Recent News

The following memo, dated March 3, 1989, was sent to all students, faculty and staff from Interim President Daniel N. Keck:

"A news story this morning in the St. Charles Post raised questions about the continued participation of Lindenwood students in the federal government's student aid programs.

"I want to state unequivocally that students at Lindenwood College are assured of the continuance of federal aid.

"We have sent to the United States Department of Education today information that we believe will satisfy the Department's letter of credit requirement. In discussions with department officials, we are confident this information will be sufficient to meet their requirements.

"If for any reason it is not sufficient, we have secured approval of a bank letter of credit should this be necessary. In all cases students will be assured of the continuance of federal assistance." (From the Office of the President.)
