Lindenwood Joins WalkAmerica

Lindenwood College is proud to be the St. Charles sponsor for the 1994 March of Dimes "WalkAmerica" event. WalkAmerica is the nation's first and biggest walking event, and the largest annual fund-raiser for the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation. Money raised from the walk supports the Campaign for Healthier Babies, a nationwide effort to prevent birth defects and infant mortality. The Campaign includes programs of research, community services, education and advocacy.

Author! Author!

The history of St. Louis was explored in the plays of George Hickenlooper in the "Saint Louis in the Guilded Age" exhibit at the History Museum. Hickenlooper, associate professor of English, wrote six 10-15 minute vignettes that highlight themes from the late 1800's in St. Louis. The plays were centered around the exhibit's streetcar, which recreates the mood of the original mule-drawn trolley. Each play discussed important societal concerns of the 1800's that are still important to us today. The Guilded Age Dramatic Vignettes were presented last winter.

Financial Reviews

Tom Goldberg, adjunct professor of management, was published in the St. Louis Small Business Monthly in October. He wrote a book review on Scoring Millions by James H. Dayley. Goldberg teaches finance in the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Field Trip

In October, William Felty, assistant professor of business administration, and Don Babbitt, associate professor of management, took 20 accounting students to a Career Day program sponsored by the Missouri Society of Certified Public Accountants. The program was offered as a means of introducing students with various career opportunities in the accounting profession.

"Art In Transit"

Michael Castro, professor in LCIE, and Adelia Parker-Castro, photographer and LCIE student, have been teaching fourth through sixth graders about poetry and visual arts for the Bi-State "Art In Transit" program. The poetic duo visited five schools in the St. Louis, Wellston and East St. Louis areas. Their workshops concentrated on expressing concrete poems that combine visual arts and poetry about the MetroLink. The students' poetry will be displayed in MetroLink cars sometime in 1994. Castro also served as a reader for the Thomas Merton Workshop held at Washington University in December.

John Tieman and Phoebe Cirio, adjunct professors in LCIE, have spoken at Kiwanis monthly breakfasts about non-violent conflict resolution. The talk is the outgrowth of an article "Violent Behavior Is Learned Behavior" coauthored by the husband and wife team, which appeared in a December issue of the Post-Dispatch.


Emmy Award Winner

At the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences (NATAS) St. Louis Mid-America Emmy Awards last fall, Carole Knight received an Emmy for Individual Achievement in the category Writing, Other Than News.
