LU Student Newspaper Debuts Wednesday

The first issue of The Legacy, Lindenwood's new student newspaper, will be out Wednesday, March 7.

The newspaper's advisor is journalism professor Tom Pettit, whose editing class will produce the paper with stories from two reporting classes and other communications majors. Pettit said two more papers will be published later in the spring—April 11 and May 9.

Contributions from students are welcome, Pettit said, but stories will be edited. He said space is severely limited in the early editions of the paper. The Legacy will serve primarily as a lab project for journalism and other communications majors to learn how to gather and write news.

One necessary skill these students will learn is how to develop reliable sources to help them deliver accurate, dependable stories. Pettit said those

students may call on faculty and staff members for information about events and activities at Lindenwood. He said editors will rely on those same faculty and staff members to clarify and confirm information in stories. Pettit said the help and feedback of faculty and staff is essential to assure quality in news accounts and in the educational experience we provide for Lindenwood students. "I can assure you that our goal is to teach and insist upon accurate news coverage of the Lindenwood community," Pettit said. Pettit taught and advised publications for 10 years (1981-83 at Lindenwood) and has been in the newspaper business for more than 25 years (22 years at the Post-Dispatch). Trull was in the newspaper business for 15 years.

Lions Win NAIA Wrestling National Championship

The Lindenwood wrestling team dominated the 50th annual NAIA National Championship and won the third national title in program history.

All 12 Lion wrestlers earned All-American honors at the meet as Lindenwood's depth helped it come out on top of the 27 other teams. Lindenwood scored 177 points at the competition, the fourth-most in NAIA history, and won by 67 points, which was the second-largest winning margin at the national wrestling championships.

Lindenwood took over the meet during

the quarterfinal round late Friday night. Eleven Lion wrestlers competed in the quarterfinals and eight won their matches. No other team in the top-five at that point had more than three wrestlers remaining in the championship bracket.

The Lions continued their dominance on day two of the meet with four wrestlers advancing to the championship match and two winning individual NAIA crowns. Lindenwood also had success in the

Kacky Garner to Market Boone Home, Weldon Spring Site

Lindenwood welcomes new staff member Kacky Garner as the director of marketing for the Daniel Boone and Weldon Spring sites. Garner starts today in the position, which is new to the university. In her new role, Garner will market academic programs at both sites, as well as handle fund raising, tourism and special events at the Boone Home.

Garner was district director for U.S. Senator Jim Talent for four years. In that position, Garner ran an office in the St. Louis area for Senator Talent. Prior to that, she worked for 11 years in Washington, D.C., for U.S. Congresswoman Jo Ann Emerson (eighth congressional district in Missouri) and her husband, Bill Emerson, who served in that seat before her. Garner currently lives in St. Charles.

"I have a passion for Lindenwood," she said. "I have been interested in it for a long time. I have worked with the school on some government issues and am interested in what the school means to

wrestlebacks, having one third-place finish, two fourth-place showings, three fifth-place winners, one sixth-place finisher and one wrestler coming in seventh place.

Jake Dieffenbach (House Springs, Mo./Oakville) became the fifth Lion wrestler in school history to win two national titles when he won the 165pound crown this year. Dieffenbach went 5-0 at the national meet, including a 9-8 win in the championship match.

Lindenwood dominated the 174-pound weight class with both of its wrestlers advancing to the championship bout. John Salter (Mt. Olive, Ala.) earned a narrow 3-1 decision over Matt Cauley (O'Fallon, Mo./Fort Zumwalt West) to win the title.

Head coach Joe Parisi was named the NAIA national coach of the year after

the meet. It was the third time that he has received that honor.

The victory capped off one of the best seasons in Lindenwood wrestling history. Among the other highlights were the Lions winning the NAIA National Dual Championship and the NAIA Eastern Regional Championship and having a perfect 8-0 dual record. The national title for the wrestling program was its third this decade, as it also won in 2002 and 2005. The Lions have now finished in the top five nationally for seven straight seasons.

The title was the eighth NAIA national championship for the Lindenwood athletics department, including the seventh since 2002. Including all sports, it was the 22nd overall national championship for Lindenwood.
