## Hollis Heyn Named February Employee of Month

English Professor Hollis Heyn has been named Employee of the Month for February, making her the second honoree in the new Employee of the Month program. Heyn, who has been a full-time member of the English faculty since 1996, has a long history with Lindenwood, going back to the 1970s, when she was a student here.

Heyn earned a bachelor's in English from Lindenwood in 1975, and then later returned to the school as an adjunct in the mid-1980s to teach English classes at the General Motors plant in Wentzville.

"That was an interesting experience, because they had management and labor in the same class, and they had to learn to get along," Heyn said.

She came back as an adjunct in 1995 to teach world literature and was hired as a *Continued on next page* 

#### Women's Hockey Finishes Second in Nation

The Lindenwood women's ice hockey team fell in the championship match of the ACHA Division I National Tournament. The Lady Lions finished as the ACHA runner-up on Sunday after falling by a 4-1 score to Robert Morris.

The Lions advanced to the finals thanks to a stellar defense that allowed just one goal a game during the team's first four contests at the national event.

Lindenwood defeated Connecticut and Penn State in pool play. In the quarterfinals, the Lions knocked off St. Cloud State, and followed that with a win over Rhode Island in the semis.

The 2006 national champion Lady Lions finished the season with a 27-6-1 overall record.

The Lady Lions won their semifinal game on Saturday with a 6-1 win over Rhode Island.

Lindenwood led 2-1 after the first period and then pulled away with a pair of goals in both the second and third periods.

Six different Lady Lions scored on the day. Melanie Keith and Mandy Dion scored in the first, Lindsay Gordon and Kells scored in the second, and Amy Dlugos and Marie Blanc each put one in the net in the third.

#### Randy Biggerstaff Named to Trainers' Hall of Fame

Lindenwood's Randy Biggerstaff has been named to the Mid-American Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame and will be inducted in a ceremony on March 16 in Topeka, Kan. Biggerstaff, who was informed of is induction earlier this month, will be the association's 34<sup>th</sup> inductee and only the sixth from Missouri.

The Mid-American Athletic Trainers Association covers seven states and is one of 10 districts in the National Athletic Trainers Association.

Biggerstaff, who has been an athletic trainer for 33 years, has worked as a trainer in a variety of settings, including high school, professional sports, clinic and business owner, and his current position as head athletic trainer and athletic training program director for Lindenwood University.

full-time faculty member the following year. Heyn said she has also taught as an adjunct at a number of other St. Louis area colleges and universities, worked as a social worker in South St. Louis and even sold insurance for a year.

Heyn currently teaches American and world literature and a women's literature class she designed. In addition to that, she is the faculty treasurer; in this role, she is responsible for purchasing flowers for faculty members who are sick or have had deaths in the family, in addition to those getting married or having children.

"I love that the job gives me the opportunity to respond to people when they are ill or have had a death in the family," Heyn said. "It's hugely devastating, and I like for individual faculty members to know they are cared about."

Heyn said she enjoys flower arranging and, when she has time, she likes to do them herself. She said she also likes finding gifts for faculty members who are retiring.

"I like finding gifts that are appropriate for the person," she said. "I don't do it all myself. I get a lot of input from others on that."

Heyn is the second employee of the month at Lindenwood; the first was Pauline Hammen in the LCIE office, which Heyn said is ironic.

"I was a student at Lindenwood when Pauline started here," Heyn said. "I used to go and talk to her, and later, when I came back to work, she said she remembered me."
