## Interesting New Courses Offered Second Semester

Since final examinations are well started we can look into the second semester and see what the college is offering in the way of new courses and new instructors.

One of the new courses is Mechanical Drawing, which is in line with specifications for war work and will enable the student to apply for a defense job. All students interested in this course should sign in the office of the Dean.

In the Physical Education program a teachers' course in dancing is being offered, which is primarily for girls who are planning to teach.

Among other courses that were not scheduled at the first of the year, and which will be offered the second semester are Anatomy, Current Economic Problems, Differential Calculus, Phonetics, Advanced Organic Chemistry, and also a third section of the course in Foods is being added.

Dr. L. L. Bernard, head of the Sociology department of Washington University, is the only new instructor and will assist in the Lindenwood Sociology department.

A new course is being offered to those who are interested in drawing. It is known as Engineering Drafting and will meet six hours every week. The classes will be held at night and three credit hours will be given for a semester's work.

According to Mr. Motley, the Lindenwood girls who volunteered to sell bonds received pledges for approximately \$15,000 worth of bonds. He said that the stamp sale has been active and that many girls have converted their stamp books into bonds. Lindenwood College bought \$10,000 in bonds, and Mr. Motley stated that the total of the pledges, stamp and bond sales amounted to approximately \$30,000.
