# ACKNOWLEDGMENT

### NOTE

St. John Emile Clavering Hankin (1869-1909) was an English playwright notable for advancing the "New Drama" (the modern content and technique as inaugurated by Ibsen). He was a journalist both in England and India and also did work in dramatic criticism. His period of playwriting was from 1902 to 1909. He has been compared with Shaw and with Wilde in style. He has certain qualities of both these writers, but his wit is less brittle than Wilde's and his sociological point of view is less dominant than Shaw's.

The Cassilis Engagement is one of his best and most representative plays. It was first presented at the Imperial Theatre, London, February 10, 1907. Contemporary critics objected to the ending; but, as Hankin remarked, ". . . . anyone who does not realize that it was a 'happy ending' for all parties must be perfectly imbecile." The play has had several productions in America. An earlier Lindenwood College presentation (November 14, 1947) was co-directed by Miss McCrory\* and Mr. Hume.
