Juror No. Four—A woman of wealth and position, accustomed to working on committees, socially experienced, well poised
Juror No. Five—A naive, frightened young woman who takes her obligations very seriouslyMarsha Madden
Juror No. Six—An honest, dull-witted woman who comes to decisions slowly and carefully
Juror No. Seven—A loud, flashy, glad-handing woman who works in a department store and has more important things to do than to sit on a jury; a quick-tempered, impulsive person; a bully and a coward
Juror No. Eight—A quiet, thoughtful, gentle person who sees all sides of every question and constantly seeks the truth; a woman of strength tempered with compassion who wants justice to be done and will fight to see that it is
Juror No. Nine—A mild, gentle old woman, long since defeated by life and now merely waiting to die; a person who recognizes herself for what she is and mourns the day when it would have been possible to be courageous
Juror No. Ten—An angry, bitter woman who antagonizes almost at sight; a bigot who places no value on any human life save her own; a person who has been nowhere and is going nowhere, and knows it, deep within herself

- Juror No. Twelve—A slick, bright advertising woman who thinks of human beings in terms of percentages, graphs and polls; a superficial, companionable snob with no real understanding of people.............JANICE KELLY
