Anatole France was not primarily a dramatist; but whatever he did, he did well. He wrote the comedy of *The Man Who Married A Dumb Wife* around 1912 for private production. It was so successful, it was almost immediately taken up by the public theatre.

The author found his inspiration in a brief passage in Rabelais' Lives, Heroick Deeds, and Sayings of Gargantua and His Son Pantagruel. It is likely that a mediaeval play, based on this story, once existed. Moliere uses some elements of this plot in the third act of The Doctor in Spite of Himself (Le Médecin Malgré Lui).

The dialogue is full of universal social satire: the high cost of living, the servant problem, general extravagance, fashions, pretentions to wisdom, the loquacity of women, and so on. The production is done in a broad, stylized, non-realistic manner. Its only purpose is fun.

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You are cordially invited to attend the performance of Henrik Ibsen's A Doll's House: Roemer Auditorium, Thursday and Friday evenings, December second and third, eight o'clock. Mrs. Burton Meisel (Patt Wilkerson) will appear as Nora, the doll wife, opposite Mr. Carl Clark House as Torvald, her husband. The Department of Speech proudly presents this theatre classic, which is a senior project under the direction of Miss Mildred Gloria Bursey.
