Oldani, Hollander Serving Safety on Task Force

John Oldani, Vice President for Student Development, and Terry Hollander, Assistant Men's Basketball Coach and St. Charles County Councilman, have been appointed to a new task force that will study safety procedures at public and private schools in St. Charles County and recommend improvements. The pair was named to the committee by Steve Ehlmann, St. Charles County Executive, after the County Council passed an emergency ordinance following the tragic shootings at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newton, Conn., in December 2012.

According to a recent article in the Suburban Journals, the ordinance states that "recent events have re-emphasized the importance of preparation, including ensuring that schools, the mental health community, and law enforcement have training and procedures to enhance readiness for, and response to, threatening situations which may arise within St. Charles County." The ordinance also called for the creation of the task force consisting of at least five

educators, five people from municipal and county law enforcement, a member of the mental health treatment community, one member of the developmental disabilities service community, and two County Council members.

Oldani and Hollander will join the other 12 appointed members of the committee for two meetings in January at the St. Charles County Administration Building. They will be asked to offer preliminary findings by Feb. 1 and submit a final report by June 1.

As former school superintendent in the Rockwood and Francis Howell School Districts, Oldani brings a key viewpoint to the group. He offers a wealth of experience as an education administrator, and has also previously been involved in other school safety initiatives in the region.

Hollander, who represents approximately 51,000 residents in District 5 of St. Charles County, fills the role of serving as one of two appointed County Council members on the task force. He also offers the important perspective of having served as a student teacher observer in approximately 50 schools during the past three years.
