

## Calhoun to Lead LU-Belleville Radio Station

Tom Calhoun has been named Director of Radio Operations at Lindenwood-University-Belleville. The veteran broadcaster assumed the role after several



months of collaborating with University administrators on the facility within the school's new Communications Department.

"I started nine months ago helping oversee the construction of the LYNK radio station and I've programmed over a thousand pieces of music into our automation system," Calhoun said. "I'm currently managing station

operations, and when I finish my master's degree in September the plan is to begin teaching as well."

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Did you know that during the Great Depression, in order to help Lindenwood survive the economic downturn, the faculty and staff took a 20 percent reduction in pay? That was in 1932. In 1934, they took an additional 30 percent cut. After World War II, salaries steadily increased once again.

Calhoun brings to the role more than four decades of experience in the broadcast industry. He's been the arena announcer for the St. Louis Blues National Hockey League team for the past 25 years and is also the stadium announcer of the Gateway Grizzlies minor league baseball club. He's hosted a number of commercial radio shows over the years on WIBV, KXOX, KTRS, KMOX, and WIL.

"Tom's leadership and experience, along with his dedication in assisting and developing the skills of our students, has made him a perfect fit within the University community," said Jerry Bladdick, Vice President of LU-Belleville. "He is so passionate about helping others and growing our program, I could not think of a better person to help the University launch this exciting and innovative educational opportunity."

Calhoun said the LYNK station can be streamed through LU-Belleville's website and is also carried on the University's St. Charles-based KCLC HD 3 signal. He called his position as head of the new station a "dream job" and said he's looking forward to helping students become proficient in all aspects of broadcasting.

"I really enjoy the enthusiasm of the young people who come in here with

chance to make their dreams come true. We want to make sure they have all the skills they need to do whatever job is thrown at them."

than 15 years of demonstrated expertise in educational and organizational leadership, governance, compliance, and program management and assessment. His research interests include interdisciplinary approaches to small business and nonprofit matchmaking, and his work has been published in several management and law journals and presented at various industry conferences.
