I have only time to day to enclose you a check for \$400 on the Branch Bank of this date to your order, to put you in cash for ready money purchase, and to say that you will use your discretion as to whom to pack in on the wharf but it strikes me you will find as ready & perhaps safer, to leave every thing where you buy till you are done & then let each merchant pack and take his own articles where there are enough to make proper packages. in other cases send the little articles from one store to another to come in with larger articles. or to be packed by yourself together this however I leave to you who can best judge on the spot as white Molton is what you suppose I attach a sample, ^{as}pt that is thinner than Reg^r cotton & of better quality.

The order for the Bay runs thus from 34 wome
" per thick white Beige or half thick not
less than $\frac{7}{8}$ nor more than yds wide for leggins

"for thick white Baize you 6¹/₄ wide"
 in saying 12 ps of same price I was wrong
 I should have said 8 ps Narrow 4¹/₄ of the
 wide you may buy then 2 ps of the half
 thick you describe and 14 ps of what is called
 Rocking Baize - all white - as to the mock
 garnets - I find they have been bought from
 1¹/₂ to 30 cts per maf - If you will put them
 as low as 5 cts & maf. you may take
 5000 mafps add², If above and not higher
 than 10 cts take 1500 mafps add² as to
 cartouch knives buy if they are good in
 this kind 50 doz of those you describe with
 bone handles. The extra blankets from Coape
 may be kept as they may be wanting in
 future. I see you have found buckshot
 as they import balls if they do get ^{to} from 25 m
 from 40 to the 60 lbs.

It will be desirable to procure the
 Muskrat traps if enough can be found
 at the prices you mention, without waiting
 to have them manufactured, or as many as
 you can get - I beg you will induce the
 German Smith, to try his hand on the beaver
 traps, as it is an important article, let me
 know the wt of the sample of the calibers
 including chain and length of the chain
 and what the smith will do them for yet
