ABOUT THE PLAY

Jean Baptiste Roquelin, better known as Moliere, is one of the greatest comedy writers of all time. His riotous farces delighted and shocked French society, and had it not been for the intervention of Louis XIV, he would have been imprisoned many times. His "Le Malade Imaginaire", the last play he wrote, was a rollicking extravaganza in satire aimed at the doctors of the period. His barbed thrusts did indeed prick at a grievous social fault, but certainly some of his thrusts came because the tuberculosis from which he suffered was gradually wearing down his strength and the pretentious learned doctors were unable to aid him.

"The Imaginary Invalid" is the delightful story of the hypochondriac Argan who becomes the prey of quacks who give him drugs and purges when he actually needs mental healing. He is delighted with the inordinate attention he is receiving, and even the bills he gets coddle his ego. He makes an effort to get a doctor into the family by marrying his daughter to a quack; and finally joins the medical profession when his sister tells him that he is no more ignorant than the men who are trying to cure him.
