know there were very few colleges for women at that time, and none west of the Mississippi. From the very beginning the fame of Lindenwood spread throughout the Southwest and the records show that during these pioneer days many young women came from distant states on horseback to attend.

The College is very proud of the presidents she has had throughout these hundred years. Many of them made noble sacrifices for the education of young women. The loyalty of these students is expressed in the activities of some twenty Lindenwood Clubs from New York to California. Many members of these clubs are probably listening tonight. I should like very much to bring them greetings from Lindenwood and to say that we hear much of your college activities and thank you for the heritage you have left us.

To continue our story of Lindenwood, the college had many struggles that developed real character, and during the last few years has begun to realize some of the early ambitions of its founders. In the last years of Dr. Ayers' administration as President of the college some improvements were made. In 1914 Dr. John L. Roemer agreed to take the leadership of Lindenwood at the earnest solicitation of Col. James Gay Butler, our great benefactor, who promised to stay with Dr. Roemer if he would come out.

Under the leadership of Dr. and Mrs. Roemer the school has made really remarkable growth. Col. Butler gave the college something like three million dollars. During the last nine years the school has grown to a standard four-year college, that is fully recognized by state universities and colleges. We offer senior and junior college courses, with courses in the conservatory of music and schools of vocation.

We have four hundred and twenty girls enrolled, fourteen buildings on the grounds, and one hundred and fourteen acres of campus. The entire program at Lindenwood is given to the problems of young women. We know quite well it takes more than money and buildings, however pleasant they may be, to make a college, and we have this in our Lindenwood spirit.

So down where the mighty Mississippi meets our Missouri we have a really wonderful woman's college. We work hard and find time to play. It is a school for the development of useful women, and the democracy that exists is one of the outstanding features.

The president, Mary Clark, as referee, introduced the officials of the game, Mrs. Roemer, time keeper, and Dr. Roemer, score keeper. Toasts followed including the Tip Off, Over the Line, Unguarded Throw, Time Out, Out of Bounds, Dribble, and Field Goal, by members of the association.

Forty-three members of the association attended the four course dinner

which was prepared and served by the home economics department, under the direction of Miss Mildred Dial. The color scheme of black and yellow was carried out in the table decorations and the clever place cards.

The Athletic Association was organized in 1920 with a membership of thirty. Since that time, eighty girls, who have won honors in athletic activities, have belonged to the Association.

THE SUMMER TERM

The campus will be as busy a place this summer as it has been this winter because of the newest feature of Lindenwood's progress—a summer school especially for the benefit of alumnae members who are teaching now, and for men and women who are teachers in the community and neighboring towns and counties. The eight week summer term will offer these an opportunity to do educational work in an approved school, the credits of which will be accepted by the state department.

The education department under Roy S. Daily is largely responsible for the summer term and the courses are planned from this department's point of view. Subjects in educational work such as class room management, high school problems, and rural school management will be emphasized. However, practically every department will be represented in the curriculum, the courses offered depending upon the demand. Public school music, voice, and instrumental music will be important features. The students will also have the advantage of hearing such things as the Municipal Opera company in the city.
