Letter from John Mason to George Sibley, May 22, 1813

Sir

Herewith you will receive
Invoice of merchandise forwarded from this office
on the 11 Inst^o for your factory amount \$ 5.642.70
These goods have been packed more than two months
but owing to the very low state of the Potomak
this spring they could not be despatched earlier.

It was impossible to procure good, conformable to your regulation in these difficult times - I have however sent you such as will satisfy the Indians - I hope until we can do better - I have given you a very large proportion of the Blankets & see the shrouds that could be obtained - some of the Blankets are of the very best quality & some of them are ordinary although they cost higher than the best being purchased since the declaration of war - not being in my power to procure a sufficiency of strong & have sent you blue cloths as a substitute in part -

I expect 40 Rifles made in exact conformity with your memorandum will be loaded at Pittsburg by the time the Boat from Brownsville with the above goods reaches that place, and also a Box of sheet brass kettle turned inside and made in the fashion of trap kettle - if they should not reach there in time for the Boat they will be forwarded by the first conveyance to St Louis after -

not having procured any of S. W. Fusil I have sent you no smooth gun as you desire - I flatter myself I shall be able to get some made in Philad² in the course of this year that will please your Indians - I have one in the office made by Doringer as a sample which very much resembles a S. W. Gun but is of better finish and will cost higher - I think by a little further instruction I shall be able to bring him to the standard as to quality, & nearly so as to price

I have ordered 50 Kegs powder of 50 lb each to be lodged at Shipping port for your factory which will be shipped on board the Boat with your other goods as she passes that place - it will cost much higher than your last years supply, Nitre having advanced in price nearly 100 p c^t. I expect your powder will cost about 60 f a C^t & 80

I shall forward you an Invoice as soon as I receive an account from major morison of the exact cont — yours of the 29 Dec^r and 12 Jan^y last have been received the latter cover-
ing your account for December quarter 1812 —
your draft in favor Sere M Broome & C^o has been
paid amount of 100. my last was on the
19 Jns^r — duplicate now enclosed — Young &

The Beaver received here last fall from your factory was very far inferior to what we have hitherto received from you — the 1st quality sold for 3.60 only, if the fells had been lighter it would have sold for 4.50 to 5.00 as the article was very scarce — you shipped deer skins, tallow deer & Buffaloe horns did not bring more than first cost — In pricing your goods sent this year, you must do it according to quality & not to price being part purchased before the war & part after the declaration of war the best goods are in many instances charged at the lowest prices —
