CAMPUS NOTES

The International Relations Club, which is trying to further the interest and knowledge of international affairs and to further the cause of international peace, presented a very interesting program on January 20. Papers on the Monroe Doctrine were given by Dean Templin, and Frances Titzell and Margaret Owen.

Baron Korff of Russia, formerly a cabinet member of the Kerensky gov-

ernment, will speak at Lindenwood on February 7 under the auspices of the international relations club. He will speak with first hand knowledge of the present problems in Russia.

Mischa Lhevine, pianist and composer of San Francisco, visited Lindenwood recently while passing through on a concert tour and entertained faculty and students with an impromptu recital in the college chapel. His program, which was received with hearty enthusiasm, was composed of several Chopin numbers and three of his own composition.

With the recent snowstorm, Lindenwood girls have added coasting to their list of sports. The numerous sleds were taken out of storage and put into active service down the steep hill back of Nicolls, where the girls tobagganed, tumbled and played to their hearts' content.

A new blue "wireless" board has made its appearance opposite the post office in Jubilee. Here teachers and students may leave their notices and messages without the endless searching all over the campus to deliver each message personally.

The Senior Academy class will entertain with a Southern Garden Party on February 11. The gymnasium will be decorated in vines and flowers and the entire ceiling will be a black background covered with stars and a real southern, summer-time moon. There will be arbors and a little white fence and gate at the entrance where a colored butler will receive the guests. "Jim's Orchestra" (colored) will furnish the music.

The physical education department under the direction of Miss Louise Weld has had many interesting changes this year. In the fall classes in tennis, interpretative dancing and swimming were held. Later these classes were replaced by regular gymnasium work and corrective classes in foot work, remedial and posture. At the first of the year each girl was required to take an examination and if she had any defects, such as broken arches or spinal curvatures, she was put in these corrective classes. At the end of two months another examination was given and, if the trouble had been remedied, she was allowed to take up regular "gym" work.

Besides these classes two hours a

week of base ball and basket ball are offered as electives. At the end of this season the gym classes will hold a contest and have class base ball and basket ball games. In the spring there will also be field and track and tennis, interpretative dancing and swimming.

The dramatic art class under the direction of Miss Porter, head of the expression department, presented two one act plays in the chapel on December 10. In the first, "Madonna", Ferne Estes, Nathine Talbot, Lyle Dickey and Freda Gunther took the parts, and in the second, "The Land of Heart's Desire", the leading part was taken by Ernest Embry, with Leone Crane, Dorothy Weber, Adelaide Hodgson, Merla Goldsmith and Udolpha Phillips assisting.

Miss Morris, professor of history and chairman of the committee on admission of Mount Holyoke College, recently visited Lindenwood on a tour of western colleges. She was much surprised to find that we were nearly a hundred years old, much older than most eastern schools.
