CAMS Conference Starts at LU

Lindenwood University hosted the first day of a CAMS (Comprehensive Academic Management Solutions) workshop on Monday in the Spellmann Campus Center. The CAMS Enterprise 16th Annual Users Conference is sponsored by system vendor Three Rivers Systems, who will host the rest of the conference Tuesday and Wednesday at the St. Charles Convention Center.

"For our portion, we had about 70 representatives from various colleges and universities attending one of two separate training classes," said Shawn Haghighi, CAMS project manager and associate professor of computer science and math. "We set aside two classrooms in which 12 trainers from Three Rivers Systems presented on creating custom reports and customizing portals."

The CAMs project at Lindenwood was implemented in phases under Haghighi's direction, beginning in 2007 and ending last year. The system efficiently ties together the computer systems of admissions, housing, financial aid, the business office and academic services, as well as allows students to register online.

Hargate to Show Ceramic Work in September

Grant Hargate, professor of fine arts, will exhibit 13 pieces of his ceramic work for a month and a half in the Messing Gallery of the Mary Institute and St. Louis Country Day School (MICDS). The free exhibit will open with a reception from 3-5 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 19.

"With the demands on faculty being relaxed, I think professional development is going to become more and more important," Hargate said. "It's definitely given me more time to do things like this show."

A professor at Lindenwood since 1983, Hargate has taught painting, design, ceramics, printmaking, color theory, drawing and figure drawing.

He typically exhibits in various media at least once a year and has presented throughout St. Charles, St. Louis, New York, Cincinnati, Kentucky, and Illinois. In the past he also has been invited to participate in group exhibitions in Japan and France.

"This MICDS show will be open to general public," Hargate said. "The gallery is on the school's campus, which is easy to get to, so I hope as many people as possible check it out."

Knotts Speaks in Hawaii on Invasive Species

David Knotts, Ph.D., dean of the School of American Studies, traveled in early March to the United States Naval Station in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, to speak with members of the Preventative Medicine Division about problems created by invasive species and species of concern. The educational presentation focused on the economic and ecologic impact of non-native plants and animals being introduced into regions from which they did not evolve.



"More than 100 million acres in the U.S. are lost to invasive plants each year, and exotic animals and microorganisms cost the country more than \$100 billion in wildfire, erosion, and flooding damages that result from altered ecosystems," Knotts said. "It's important to train naval personnel, who travel around the world, on the importance of taking preventative measures to preserve environments."

In keeping with naval tradition, Knotts was presented with a commander's coin as a token of appreciation for his services. The coin is typically given in recognition of a job well done.
