Did you know that in 1970, while many college campuses around St. Louis were experiencing student protests over the Vietnam War and deaths at Kent State, Lindenwood took a more reserved path to expressing their views? On May 11th, classes were suspended in order to hold a day-long discussion on foreign policy. Missouri Attorney General John Danforth was the keynote speaker.

"He spent countless hours in the dorm and on the telephone making sure everything was moving along," wrote Weber's nominator. "He worked with various types of personalities and was able to get along with them, took initiative to learn from different inspectors, engineers, and contractors about the complex sprinkler system, and even shared his findings with others in the department in order to avoid similar problems in the future."

While his nominator raved about the reasons why he should be named Employee of the Month, Weber never expected to receive the award.

"I was surprised, I didn't have a clue," he said. "But I feel honored and it's nice to know that I'm appreciated and that my work is appreciated."
