SBE Team Celebrates Completion of Self-Study

The Lindenwood University School of Business and Entrepreneurship submitted this month the findings of a two-year self study to the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP). The move brings the school closer to its goal of receiving a 10-year accreditation from the organization.

"We went into candidacy and started this journey in 2007," said Associate Professor and Self- Study Coordinator Renee Porter, Ph.D. "A diverse group of faculty members, graduate assistants, and volunteers – along with invaluable support from the entire University- worked incredibly hard to put this together."

The ACBSP cites its missions as, "developing, promoting, and recognizing best practices that continue to contribute to continuous improvement of business education and accredits

qualified business programs." The organization judges applicants on six major standards, including: leadership, strategic planning, student and stakeholder focus, student learning and performance, faculty and staff focus, and education and business process management.

In late February, a team of peer evaluators from other ACBSP-accredited schools will conduct a Lindenwood site visit. They will meet with Dean Ed Morris, faculty, students, and alumni for several days. A final decision will be announced in April.

"They are very much focused on continuous improvement," Porter said. "To receive accreditation from the ACBSP is a true mark of quality, and it would certainly validate our efforts to demonstrate our commitment to that same cause."

Javier New Director of Corporate and Foundation Relations

Sarah Javier has been named Director of Corporate and Foundation Relations in the Lindenwood University Office of Institutional Advancement. Javier, who started her new job on Wednesday, January 20, was most recently director of alumni and constituent relations for Washington University Medical School.

Prior to that position, which she held for three years, she was special events coordinator and annual gifts officer for St. Louis Children's Hospital. "I'm excited about all the growth and opportunity," Javier said. "Lindenwood is really taking off, and it's exciting to be a part of something like that."

"I think it is wonderful that so many individuals from the area are educated here and then remain in the community where they are able to make a positive impact," Javier said.

New Business Professor 'Fell in Love' with LU

Lindenwood University has welcomed Okey Peter Onyia, Ph.D., as Assistant Professor of Marketing in the School of Business and Entrepreneurship. He brings to the position a wealth of experience in the areas of marketing, communications, branding, and advertising.

Originally from West Africa, Onyia worked for 18 years at an ad agency in Lagos, Nigeria. After achieving great success, he made the decision to take another professional path.



"I'd worked hard and risen to the level of CEO within the company," he said. "I just reached a point where I felt I'd done everything I wanted to do."

Onyia began pursuing a doctoral degree in marketing from the University of Strathclyde in Glascow, Scotland, in 2005. He served as a marketing tutor at the school between 2006 and 2008, and also worked for 14 months as a marketing teacher at nearby Bournemouth University.

Upon earning his doctorate in 2009, Onyia began searching for a teaching position that would allow his wife and five sons, who currently still reside in Nigeria, to join him.

"It came down to a few prospects all around the United States," he said. "But when I visited, I just fell in love with St. Charles and with Lindenwood."

Wisdom's Doctoral Dissertation Being Published

Wisdom earned her doctoral degree in education from Lindenwood in December, 2008, and began teaching as an adjunct professor at the school in January, 2009. By June, she had become a full-time faculty member.

"I've had a delightful year," Wisdom said. "It was a pleasure being a student here and now it's a pleasure working here. I'm still finding it to be a very exciting change."

Applicants must also submit a 200-300 word essay describing their personal goals and aspirations for college and their plans for applying their education and talents in the future.
