Wallace Employee of the Month for July



Tom Wallace, director of corporate and foundation relations at Lindenwood University, has been named the Employee of the Month for July. He has worked in the position since January, 2008, raising funds to support the growth and development of the university.

Wallace's efforts are currently focused on Lindenwood's Business

Campaign for the expansion and renovation of Harmon Hall (the future home of the School of Business and Entrepreneurship). He has nearly 20 years of experience in the field and is well-known in the St. Louis metro area.



Did you know that Lindenwood was one of the first colleges in the United States to offer Januaryterm classes? In 1967, Lindenwood switched to 4-1-4 calendar, in which students were encouraged to enroll in a four week Jterm class where travelling abroad and/or specialty classes were emphasized.

"His skills and focused efforts as a fundraiser have resulted in innumerable leads and connections in the world of higher education benefactors," said James Evans, Ph.D., president of Lindenwood. "As well, he has effectively served as our point person in initiatives that Lindenwood undertakes for the United Way of Greater St. Louis."

Wallace, pictured above, said he enjoys seeing the benefits students experience because of his fundraising efforts.

Arns has Unique Perspective on Shaq/Albert Showdown

Four years ago, Business Professor David Arns began volunteering to run the manual scoreboard for the River City Rascals minor league baseball team at T.R. Hughes Ballpark in O'Fallon. Little did he know that his scoreboard gig would afford him a unique view of a homerun hitting contest between baseball's best hitter and one of basketball's biggest stars.

On Thursday of last week, NBA star Shaquille O'Neal was in town to challenge Albert Pujols to a home run hitting contest for a new show called "Shaq vs." In the show, which debuted Tuesday night, Aug. 18, at 8 p.m. on ABC, O'Neal engages in athletic contests with top athletes in their

respective sports. The debut episode featured a contest with Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Rothlisberger, for instance. Other challenges include Serena Williams in tennis, Michael Phelps in



swimming, David Beckham in soccer and Oscar de la Hoya in boxing. The show will air at 8 p.m. on Tuesdays.

As of this writing, there was no air date publicized for the Pujols episode. Arns said the stadium was packed to capacity with 6,000 spectators, who were undeniably partisan in their support for hometown favorite Pujols.

Arns runs the scoreboard with his son, Chris, and supervises a group of other volunteers who work on the scoreboard throughout the season, coordinating schedules and making sure all the games are covered.

Seeking to keep the surprise intact for television viewers of the Shaq vs. Pujols contest, Arns would not say who came out ahead, but he did offer a hint or two.

"My son, Chris, and I really enjoyed working the scoreboard for the Shaq v. Pujols home run hitting contest," Arns said. "Pujols was hitting so many home runs so fast that we had to scramble just to keep up with him. He's an amazing hitter, and it was really special knowing that we were keeping score for one of the greatest players in the history of baseball."

Baum Hired by Institutional Advancement Office

Depression-Era Cartoons Coming to Boyle Gallery

Some of the finest editorial cartoons in the country will be on display in the Boyle Family Gallery at Lindenwood University from Sunday, Oct. 11, through Sunday, Nov. 1. The exhibit, "Wall Street and Main Street: Editorial Cartoons on the Economic Crisis of the 1930s from the St. Louis Post-Dispatch," chronicles the events of the Great Depression from 1929-1941.

The show is sponsored by the State Historical Society of Missouri and features 43 pieces by renowned editorial cartoonist Daniel Fitzpatrick. Known for his compelling use of symbolism, Fitzpatrick is a Pulitzer-prize winning cartoonist who was employed by the St. Louis Post-Dispatch from 1913-1958.

"The exhibit also includes large and small panels that describe the events of each year represented in the cartoons," said Joan Stack, Ph.D., curator of art collections at the state historical society. "Each cartoon will also be labeled with information explaining the picture's historical context of the imagery."

The Boyle Family Gallery is located inside the J. Scheidegger Center for the Arts. The exhibit will be free and open to public from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and from Noon to 4 p.m. on Sundays.
