Conference highlights included a keynote address by Henry L. Roediger III, Ph.D., Dean of Academic Planning and Professor of Psychology at Washington University in St. Louis; a speech by James. D. Evans, Ph.D., President of Lindenwood University; a faculty workshop luncheon; and graduate program information tables hosted by staff and alumni.

The conference was made possible by the MUPC committee's fundraising efforts. Nohara-LeClair, Toni RincónGallardo, Colleen Biri, and Sarah Fryman secured grants from the International Honor Society in Psychology and the Society for the Teaching of Psychology, as well as donations from various textbook publishers.

"Lindenwood also lent generous support for the event," said Nohara-LeClair. "Most notably, the University extended invitations to all 13 public high schools in Saint Charles County to attend as our guests."

Nohara-LeClair pointed out that the conference has created a sense of excitement about research among Lindenwood psychology students.

## **Veteran Superintendent Focuses on Leadership**

The Lindenwood University Educational Leadership Speaker Series welcomed its first presenter on Monday, Oct. 26, in the Spellmann Campus Center. Bernie DuBray, Ed.D., Superintendent of Schools for the Fort Zumwalt School District, delivered an address titled "Focus on Leadership."

DuBray has worked tirelessly in the field of education for more than 40 years. He has served in his current role for 25 years, and has been on the job longer than any other public school superintendent working in a single district within the state of Missouri.

Topics covered during his presentation included passing school bonds,

incorporating a "share the wealth" mentality into the system, and handling collective bargaining sessions between teachers and school board members. He also discussed themes surrounding humility, contingency plans, collaborative processes, and conflict resolution.

Each speaker is invited to share experiences that inspire a sense of commitment to improvement among current and future professionals in the field.

#### Lindenwood Hosts ACE Network Higher Ed Workshop

In an effort spearheaded by Dr. Jann Weitzel, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Lindenwood University on Friday hosted a women's leadership





workshop put on by the Missouri American Council on Education (ACE) Network for Women.

The workshop, titled "Leadership Competencies: What you need to prepare for the challenges facing higher education," was held in the Anheuser-Busch Leadership Room and attended by representatives of higher education institutions from throughout the region. After a breakfast at 8 a.m., Weitzel addressed the attendees, welcoming them to Lindenwood and speaking about the skills needed for success in higher education. She was one of two initial speakers at the workshop, the other being Carla Chance, Vice Chancellor for Finance and Business Services at St. Louis Community College. The workshop, which included breakout sessions, lasted until noon.

"This was the first time this organization has met in the St. Louis area," Weitzel said. "It was an honor to have women in higher education come to Lindenwood and have the opportunity to network and discuss steps taken by women interested in positions in higher education."

Weitzel said she received a lot of positive feedback from those in attendance, particularly about the facilities.

"This was the first time many of these women had been on our campus," Weitzel said. "They were really appreciative and impressed with our campus, which was nice."
