Sir

I had been led by your address of

in which Mr. Ely parted with them at St. Louis, to expect on
their arrival here, to realize the fine hopes, which your letter
had raised. It is mortifying however, to state, that the
arrival of these guns, presents a spectacle such, as it is believed by
never before been exhibited at this Office.

Not only are the guns about ~~half~~ ^{one} quarter, or even
as to size, to gun, but the worms have eat them literally to
pieces.

This exhibition has led to some apprehensions
that an exchange may have made in your guns, for these, on
the route, but where, I am at a loss to conjecture. If Mr.
Kennedy were absent from St. Louis, during their stay there,

at home, and had these guns in his particular & personal care,

you come on, look into this matter, as well as you may
