Record Number of Students Return to Improvements, New Services

The fall semester is under way with a record 3,700 resident students on campus today at Lindenwood University. The students returned to several campus improvements and new services, and much more on the horizon.



Did you know that one of the most respected ant biologists in the scientific community taught here at Lindenwood? Mary Talbot, who taught here between 1934 and 1968, spent nearly every summer for 40 years investigating the ants found at the Edwin S. George Reserve in Michigan. During that time, Talbot discovered a new species of ant which was named in her honor and published numerous scientific articles that are still used today.

Most notably, the first classes are being held today in the Lindenwood Center, which is the palatial home of the School of Fine and Performing Arts. The new building will be the performance venue for Lindenwood's theatre, music and dance programs in addition to a destination for a full range of touring professional performers, including the opening act, Liza Minnelli, who will perform two shows on Sept. 11 and 12.

Students will also notice redesigned, reconfigured and refurbished parking lots and drives around Roemer and Harmon halls, which allow for greater safety and ease of passage, as well as a 25 percent increase in the number of spaces in the Roemer lot and improved aesthetics.

Two new dorm buildings are also welcoming their first students this fall. Pfremmer Hall and an as yet unnamed residence hall were completed over the summer and are the seventh and eighth new residence halls constructed on campus since 2000.

Also starting this semester, students will have access to an on-campus health center, which is located in the Connection room of the Spellmann Center. The health center, which is open to students only, is operated in cooperation with SSM Healthcare and will be available for students with minor injuries and ailments.

In the coming weeks, students will see the beginning of a construction project at Harmon Hall, which will be refurbished and expanded in three phases and will become the new home of the Lindenwood School of Business and Entrepreneurship.

Turner Nominated for Dove Award

Julie Turner, Ph.D., assistant professor of non-profit administration, recently was nominated for a 2008 Dove Award. Sponsored by Saint Charles Business Magazine, the awards honor successful women who, through their personal and professional activities, inspire others.

Turner, pictured at right, is actively involved in area non-profit organizations and currently dedicates volunteer hours to Westgate Christian Academy in St. Peters. She was a founding member of the school, where her three children - Sarah, Meagan, and Erin- currently attend.

Never one to overlook resources, Turner also encourages her students to consider civic involvement. "It's been great," she said. "My classes are always adopting a new non-profit agency or partnering with a non-profit organization on some type of community project."

Although Turner did not receive the award, she was supported by a table of well-wishers that included her husband and several Lindenwood University colleagues.

Stuhler's LU Picnics Planned With Family In Mind

Eric Stuhler, Lindenwood's in-house legal counsel and director of planned giving, has been named Employee of the Month for June, largely in recognition of something that had nothing to do with his legal or planned giving work.

Stuhler was nominated because he was the father of this summer's picnics for alumni and employees. He came up with the idea for both picnics and was the principal organizer. The idea started with family in mind.

"We have so many events that take us away from our families that I thought it would be good to have something to bring families to campus," Stuhler said. "I wanted to make sure it was kid-friendly, too."

The alumni picnic on June 21 brought 125 people to campus, followed by a crowd of 250 for the employee picnic on July 16. Picnic-goers enjoyed games like horseshoes and washers, sack races, baby races, three-legged races and other fun activities, as well as pony rides, picnic food and the ice cream man. Prizes were handed out for children and families.

Stuhler's history with Lindenwood goes back to the 1970s, when he was a student here.

"Dr. Evans was my psych and stats teacher," Stuhler said.

Stuhler graduated in the class of 1974 and after law school served on the alumni board for 25 years. He was also the first male president of the Lindenwood Alumni Association. He joined the staff full time in October 2006.

"For 25 years I practiced law and was an adjunct professor," Stuhler said. "Lindenwood was my favorite client. Now it is my only client. I feel like I never left."

Stuhler's younger daughter, Allison, is currently an LU student, and his older daughter, Amanda, graduated in 2006.



"I've always believed in Lindenwood," Stuhler said. "I could have never imagined driving past the school and sending my kids somewhere else for college. I truly believe that Lindenwood is hallowed ground. I feel my job is to protect it, support it and make it better."


Executive Offices Welcome Jennifer Ferrell
