

Kantz named July Employee of the Month



Robert "Mike" Kantz, senior production stage manager of the Center for Fine and Performing Arts, has been named Employee of the Month for July. Kantz, pictured at left, graduated from Lindenwood in 1995 with a degree in technical theater and has been employed here since August 2007.

Before returning to work for his alma mater, Kantz worked for more than 10 years as a Broadway stagehand. He's been involved in several top-rated shows, including '*Tommy*,' '*Sesame Street*,' '*The Music Man*,' '*Evita*,' '*Cats*,' and '*Jesus Christ Superstar*.'

"I've been to all 50 states and three countries," Kantz said. "Along the way I've met some stars who are great people, but in the end everyone is there just to do their job."

Kantz's job at the Lindenwood center is to manage details. He oversees the technical side of sound, lighting, props, carpentry and electrical projects to keep the building in working order for performances. Scheduling and purchasing also fall under his purview.

"Basically, I handle the logistics," said Kantz.

As the center gears up to host its debut performance, Liza Minnelli on Sept. 11 and 12, Kantz says the biggest challenge is simply getting a new building put together to make the space work well.

"I'll be glad once the game plan is in place, we get rolling and it all works," he said.

On the Employee of the Month award, Kantz said he was surprised to have been selected because of the behind-the-scenes nature of his job.

"Even though people may not see me, they've noticed my work and I'm honored."

Philosophy Program Seeks to Name Philosophy Award for Charron

The Philosophy Program has decided to honor Dr. Donna Card Charron, who passed away on July 31, by naming the annual Philosophy Award after her. Faculty and staff who are interested in contributing to the naming of the Dr. Donna Card Charron Philosophy Award may make contributions through Lucy Morros, vice president for institutional advancement, at 636-949-4532.

Charron, who taught at Lindenwood from 1989 until her retirement in 2005 as full professor of philosophy, laid the foundation for the Philosophy Program at Lindenwood and helped to establish it as a regular major. She also helped found the Honors Program and Honors College and established the Coffee Conversation speaker series and in numerous other ways supported the life and culture of the university. She was granted Professor Emerita status in 2006.

Charron received her Ph.D. from Washington University, working as a public relations and public opinion researcher for 20 years before starting her teaching career. She also established the Atchison Art Association and founded and the Midtown Arts Center of Saint Louis. She was president of Card Industries from 1980 until her death.

She founded the Ste. Genevieve Convention and Visitors Bureau and was responsible for numerous activities in promoting Ste. Genevieve and its French heritage. She was the author of a book on the St. Louis Woman's Club as well as a number of scholarly articles on business and economic philosophy.

LU 7th Largest Among Private Kansas-Missouri Schools

Lindenwood University is ranked seventh on the list of the 25 largest private colleges and universities in Missouri and Kansas, according to *Ingram's* magazine. The list is compiled annually by the Kansas City business publication, and featured in the August "Best of Business" issue.

The list is based on each university's reported fall enrollment from the previous year. Lindenwood's top spot was earned by an impressive 8,756 students last fall. Of those, 5,230 were undergraduate and 3,526 were graduate enrollments.

"We are fortunate to have experienced such growth throughout the years here at Lindenwood," said President James D. Evans, Ph.D. "It's an honor to be recognized for our work in creating one of the best universities in the Midwest.
